HIGH PRICED VEGETABLES EXPECTED

Their Weekly Meeting.

SATURDAY, Nov. 26. The principal features of the local wholesale trade situation this week were the advances in grain, the decline in sugar, the strength of coffee, dried fruits, eggs, butter and cheese, and a generally firmer feeling throughout all the markets. The week's business was large, despite the holiday, and operations were characterized by a feeling

of confidence and cheerfulness. The greatest potato-producing State in the Union is New York, which devotes (round numbers being used in all cases) 370,000 neres, raises 30,000,000 bushels, or fully oneseventh of the entire crop of the country lows is second in amount raised-17,000,000 bushels-though its area, 187,000 acres, is eclipsed by the 203,000 which Pennsylvania gives to the raising of 16,000,000 bushels. The four New England States of Maine, New Hamp shire, Vermont and Massachusetts, how ever, lead the country in the number of bushels produced per acre, the average for the four States being over 100 bushels an acre, which is attained by no other States except remote Washington, which promises to become one of the finest potato-growing
