A NEW YORK BANKER'S PROPOSITION

BRUSSELS, Dec. 1.—[Copyright.]—The American delegates have almost unanimously reached the conclusion that the Monetary Conference will prove abortive.

The plan itself was a great disappointment. Nearly all regarded it as impracticable in the form in which it was presented, and the verdict of nearly all countries has been the same effect.
