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AIDS TO ASTRONOMY.

Observations of the Past Year at Cambridge and in Peru

MAKE GREAT STRIDES FORWARD.
Some of the Discoveries of Vast Interest to All Scientists.

EXCELLENT PHOTOGRAPHS BEING MADE
(SPECIAL TELEGRAM TO THE DISPATCH.)
BOSTON, Dec. 1.—Prof. Pickering says in his annual report, just issued, that the Harvard astronomers made a great many interesting astronomical discoveries last year, both in Cambridge and in Peru.

THE NUMBER OF STARS OF THE FIFTH TYPE HAS BEEN INCREASED BY EIGHT, MAKING THE TOTAL NUMBER NOW KNOWN OF THE OBJECTS 45. The hydrogen line was shown to be bright in the spectra of six stars in addition to those already known.

THE AMOUNT OF VALUABLE MATERIAL ACCUMULATED WITH THESE INSTRUMENTS IS CONTINUALLY INCREASING, AND HAS PROVED USEFUL IN MANY CASES IN STUDYING THE PAST HISTORY OF THE SOLAR SYSTEM.

A LARGE NUMBER OF PHOTOGRAPHS WERE TAKEN OF THE SUN'S SURFACE BY TELEGRAPHIC MESSAGES FROM THE OBSERVATORY AT PERU.

MANY PHOTOGRAPHS OF THE LUNAR ECLIPSE OF NOVEMBER 15, 1891, WERE TAKEN, BOTH AT CAMBRIDGE AND AT THE BOYDEN OBSERVATORY IN ARIQUIPA, PERU.

SOME OF THE PHOTOGRAPHS TAKEN.
Many photographs of the lunar eclipse of November 15, 1891, were taken, both at Cambridge and at the Boyden Observatory in Arizpa, Peru.

THE OBSERVATIONS TAKEN IN PERU HAVE BEEN VERY VALUABLE. MANY INTERESTING RESULTS HAVE BEEN DERIVED FROM THE PHOTOGRAPHS OF THE MOON'S SURFACE MADE AT THAT PLACE.

THE PRESENCE OF THE DARK AND NARROW STREAKS CALLED CANALS BY SCHIAPARELLI HAS BEEN CONFIRMED, AND VARIOUS MEASUREMENTS OF THEM HAVE BEEN MADE.

THE AUGUST OCCULTATION OF JUPITER WAS OBSERVED, BOTH VISUALLY AND PHOTOGRAPHICALLY, ALSO THE NEW STAR IN AURIGA AND SWIFT'S COMET.

THE APPROACHING COMPLETION OF THE NEW BRUCE PHOTOGRAPHIC TELESCOPE IS REFERRED TO AT LENGTH BY PROF. PICKERING. IT IS SUCCESSFUL IT WILL BE THE MOST POWERFUL IN THE WORLD.

THE VALUE OF PHOTOGRAPHS OBTAINED WITH THE TRANSIT PHOTOGRAPH WAS ILLUSTRATED WHEN THE NEW STAR IN AURIGA WAS DISCOVERED, IN FEBRUARY, 1892.

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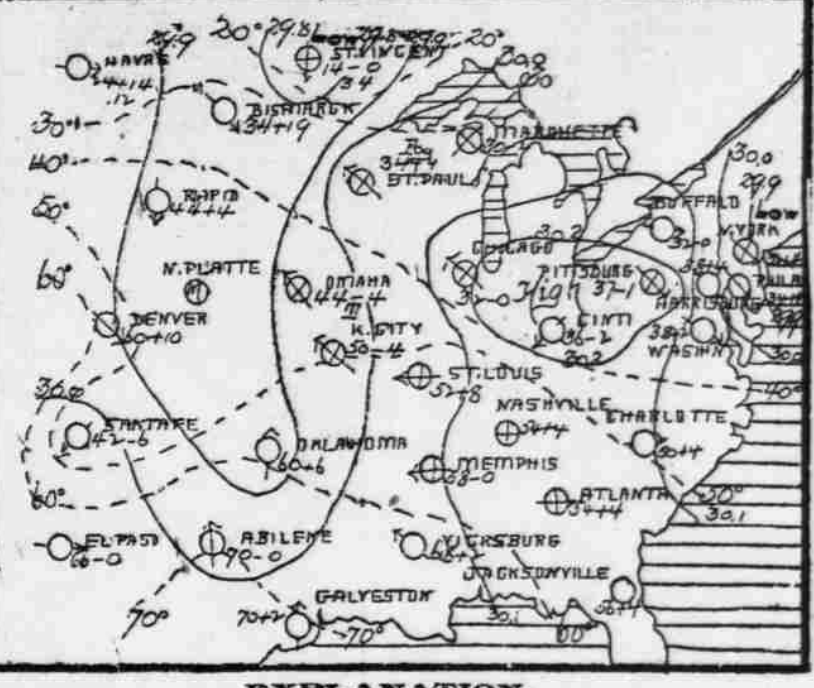
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OUR DAILY WEATHER MAP.

FOR WESTERN PENNSYLVANIA, WEST VIRGINIA AND OHIO—Generally fair; winds becoming south; warmer in West Virginia and Ohio.

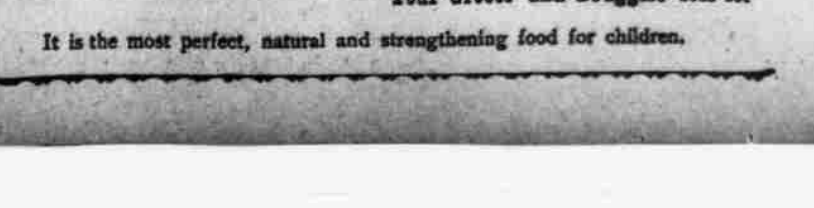
