### THE HEYDAY IS PAST.

Susiness Takes a Less Favorable Turn With Winter's Advent.

THERE BIG FINANCIAL EVENTS

Are the Monetary Conference, Gold Exports and Gould's Death.

IRON MARKET SOMEWHAT WEAKER

NEW YORK, Dec. 2.-R. G. Dun & Co.'s weekly review of trade says: The beginning of gold exports in November and their expected continuance tends to weakness. The death of Mr. Gould and unfavorable reports from the Monetary Conference have somewhat affected all speculative markets. There are also some symptoms of diminished activity in business, and while manufacturers are generally occupied with orders taken some time ago, there is more complaint that new orders do not come forward as was expected.

While the volume of trade is still very large, it is not surprising that there should be somewhat less activity during the remainder of the year, except in holiday lines. At the same time, there is general confidence that business early next year will be active and prosperous. A setback in speculation would be, by no means, an unmixed evil, but there are no signs of disturbance at present, though the money markets are working a little closer.

The State of the Iron Trade,

At Pittsburg pig iron is slightly weaker, with more eagerness to sell; but finished fron is in good demand and all the mills fairly well employed. Trade in glass is large in volume, though at low prices. In gen-eral, iron is weaker, with pressure to sell some Southern brands. Copper has sold largely at 12612/c, and lead is lower. Coal is mirly active, and bituminous is scarce

and dear.

Breadstuffs have been stronger, which is natural in view of the very low prices, though Western receipts of wheat have been 4,500,000 bushels in four days, against Atlantic exports of only \$24,000 bushels. A rise of about a cent in wheat and oats and three quarters in corp resulted from modern

Atlantic exports of only 25,000 olsaels. A rise of about a cent in wheat and oats and three-quarters in corn resulted from moderate transactions, but hogs and lard are elightly lower, and coffee declined a quarter. Cotton rose to 10 cents and reacted to 9% cents, sales again exceeding all records, being 2,550, baies for the week.

In drygoods the season has been one of unprecedented activity. A general boom and advance appears in cotton. Exports of merchandise from New York fall \$5,277,000 below last year's in November, and are probably \$10,000,000 lower at cotton ports for the same month, but even with this decrease the excess of exports over imports must have been hear.

Business failures during the last week number 269, compared with 209 last week. For the corresponding week of last year, the figures were 350.

Bradstreet's Notes the Weekly Features.

Bradstreet's will say: The features of the week are the exceptionally favorable position of the cotton mills North and South; the heavy advance in the price of print cloths, Me to 4 1-16c; the outlook for a further advance to 4%c per yard; increased buoyancy at the South, due to high prices for cotton, and the reaction in asking prices for some and the reaction in asking prices for some grades of pig iron of 25c per ton in Northern markets, and of 50c per ton of steel billets.

Wool is very quiet, with prices barely steady, and no speculative feeling in any direction. Our Australian takings are only one-half those of a year ago. Cotton has reacted somewhat from recent highest quotations, due to realizing sales.

Speculation for the past week was outwardly dull, narrow and professional to a degree. Beneath the surface, however, Wall street was experiencing a greater agitation

The market has, in fact, simply been waiting for matters of importance to develop. Mr. Gouid's illness and death ranked first in effect upon the sentiment of those operators who indulged in any activity. The prospect of gold shipments, possibly, on a large scale, has also been a prominent factor in the proceedings, while the new from the Monetary Conference was discussed with an interest that shows how keenly the street appreciates the bearing of the financial and currency problems which confront the country upon the ultimate course of values.
