LAREDO, TEX., Dec. 11.—A telegram was received by Colonel Green, commanding the Mexican troops at Nuevo Laredo from Guerrero, Mexico, to the effect that three squad of Garza men had crossed the Rio Grande into Mexico yesterday evening, one squad at San Ignacio, another at Ramiriz and the other at a place not named. It also states that the one crossing at San Ignacio made Mexican troops on the river bank, where a bloody fight took place.

FOR WESTERN PENNSYLVANIA, WEST VIRGINIA AND OHIO—Fair; Variable Winds. Warmer in West Virginia and Ohio.

WEATHER CONDITIONS.—Generally fair weather prevails throughout the United States, except in Texas, where rain has fallen since morning, and on the Florida Peninsula, where a rainfall of 1.64 inches is reported. An area of unusually high pressure extends over the whole country east of the Rocky Mountains, being central over the Upper Ohio, where the barometer is 30.65 inches. Signals are displayed at Corpus Christi and on the Atlantic Coast from Jacksonville to Key West.

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 11.—(Special.)—Much speculation is going on among those distinguished Pennsylvania agriculturists, George W. Childs, A. J. Cassatt, Don Cameron, George B. Roberts, A. J. Drexel, A. K. McClure and A. A. McClellan, as to who shall succeed Uncle Jerry Rusk as Secretary of Agriculture. What Mr. Cassatt wants is a man who can distinguish a cob horse from a cow, and Colonel McClure would like a farmer at the head of the Agricultural Department who could raise canned tomatoes from the seed without transplanting or grafting eggs from the egg plants, and who could grow straw hats by cross-drilling the wheat.

OVER A CENTURY OLD.

A Maryland Woman Who Has Passed Her 101st Birthday.

MIDDLETOWN, Md., Dec. 11.—(Special.)—Miss Elizabeth Appelman, of this town, celebrated her 101st birthday, to-day. She is the oldest white woman in Maryland. In and around Middletown, where she has lived for the past 83 years, she is familiarly known as Aunt Betsy. She was born in Virginia, the daughter of a Revolutionary War hero, and is the daughter of Philip and Mary M. Appelman, and the second of a family of six children, of which she is the only survivor. Her brother, Jacob Appelman, died two years ago, at the age of 97.
