





White mates in two moves







(a.) This game was published in Spain just 242 years ago by J. G. Canalejas, in 1850. In his book he publishes certain leading games, known to-day as openings, and it goes a long way to prove that all of the standard openings of to-day were in practice then, and how much earlier we have no means of knowing. But a few years ago the 'inds' of Egypt take us back about 2,800 years further than our Spanish authority. 'The embalmed Pharaoh, Hamesce III., of the twentieth Egyptian dynasty, who is supposed to have lived 1,200 years before the Christian era, was disinterred at the village of Buiak, a well-known suburb of Cairo, in the presence of the Khedive and other notables. The clumber of death has been carefully laid bare by competent hands, and we see his deeds recorded on the walls, his enemies trampled under his feet, etc. Then in another sculpsure we see him enjoying his spare time in playing checkers with a favorite. What game he was playing will ever remain a conundrum, as no record of Ramescs' problems has come down to us." The above can afford very little comfort to those who claim to be the first to give this or that line of play, etc.

(b) One of our ex-champlous two years ago claimed this was new, and he was the first to use it. Drummond also gives the whole game, as it appears in the Spanish work of 1850 copied into 'The American Draucht Player,' 'variations 2 and 10,

eturns of the Recent Election at Last Received From Every State-One Method of Figuring Mr. Cleveland's Lead Places It at 391,379.

NEW YORK, Dec. 22 .- [Special.]-The Evening Post publishes to-night the following table giving the full vote for President in all the States. The most striking feature of these figures is the small increase of the total vote in 1892 over that in 1888. Disregarding the scattering and nondescript ballots, the records during the last four Presidental contests show these totals for the Republican, Democratic, Prohibition and Greenback, Labor or People's party as it has been variously called: 1880, 9,218,251; 1884, 10,052,706, 1888, 11,370,662; 1892, 12,-028,008, as follows:

In this estimate, though, the Post credits the 85,181 votes cast for the unpledged electoral ticket in Alabama to Weaver. This was the ticket indorsed by the Republican National Committee, and, if successful, the electors would have voted for Harrison. Most authorities, therefore, hold that these 85,000 votes should be added to the Republican column in figuring the popular plurality. A similar question affects about 5,000 votes in Texas. These changes would make Cleveland's plurality in round numbers




