Who the leaders in the scheme favor for Mayor is not definitely known, but it is likely that Captain Thomas Kerr will be the man if it goes through. It is argued that a Demo-trat must go on the ticket to draw votes from that party and Captain Kerr is con-

sidered as popular a man as could be found. Several meetings have been held within the past week, one of which the Mayor attended on invitation, but thus far the tended on invitation, but thus far the firm was prospering. The suicide was soon matter has not been shaped up. It is expected that by the time the Republican Convention meets the new scheme will be ready to spring on the people.

Republicans May Nominate Gourley. The talk of the Republicans nominating Mayor Gourley on their ticket for Controller has been revived. He has many Republican friends who are advising it and their influence is being brought to bear on those who will have much to say in influencing the convention delegates. Some of the leaders themselves have already admitted the advisability of using the Mayor's name, but think the opposition to him within the party will make it impossible. Present appearances all strongly indicate that Postmaster McKean will head the Republican ticket. He retuses to admit there is any possibility of it, but by a carefully

All the Republican leaders speak favorably of him without saying they are in layor of his being the nominee, Unless a decided change comes over the situation before January 7, Mayor Gourley's name will adorn the Democratic ticket for Controller. This opinion is the one held by nearly all the leading members of the party One who has given the matter considerable attention for a specific purpose said last night that not over one Democrat in ten was opposed to the Mayor, and if the party's wish was respected he would be its candidate for Controller without embarrassing

Not Anxious for the Office.

Regarding his action on the Alliance nomination the Mayor was not prepared to talk yesterday. All his talk indicates that he don't want to assume the burden of a sampaign. He did not expect to return to his office for several days.

Sensational Stories About the Republican

Mayoralty Candidates. Allegheny politics have livened up coneiderably within a few days. The Mayoralty question is almost lost sight of in some wards, the Councilmanic contests overshadowing everything else. Stories are be ing circulated against the Mayoralty candidates on both sides now, but mud-slinging has not been resorted to. The most sensational story heard is that Major Tyler's friends are trying to capture the Reform Association. Details are not given and the Tyler people laugh at the story, but it is claimed that Councilman Charles Simon is engineering the scheme and has already sesured the election of half a dozen Tyler men into the association and that he is endeavoring to get in enough to capture a meeting on the eve of the primaries, repudiste the indorsement of Kennedy and give Tyler the indorsement instead.

The attitude of John R. Henricks is caus-ing Mayor Kennedy's friends considerable aneasiness. Mr. Henricks himself is saving pothing, but it is understood that he has decided to run as an independent Republition, and that most of Tyler's friends will give him their support. The friends of Mr. Henricks say he could be elected, but the general impression in Allegheny is that with such a combination the Democratic candidate would carry off the prize.

HOPES IT WILL BE A GOOD MAN.


