HAVANA HARBOR & PLAGUE SPOT

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28 .- The sub-committee having charge of the subject of establishing a national quarantine have agreed upon a bill which they will report to the full committee at its next regular meeting after the recess on Friday week. The bill agreed upon is a combination of Senator Harris' Senate bill and of a measure introduced in the House by Mr. Rayner. It puts the national quarantine system into the hands of the Hospital Service of the Revenue Marine. Its leading provisions are:

First-That wherever State quarantine regulations exist the Hospital Service of

Second-Where there are no State quarantine regulations or where, in the opinion of the Marine Hospital Service, the quarantine regulations of the State are insufficient te prevent the introduction of contagious diseases into the United States, the Marine Hospital Service shall report the facts to the Secretary of the Treasury, who, if in his judgment it is necessary or proper, shall order the Marine Hospital Service to make such additional rules and regulations is are necessary to prevent the introduction of such diseases into the United States from toreign countries or in one State from another State. If in such event the State or municipal authorities shall fail to enforce such rules and regulations, then the President may detail officers for that purpose. Weekly Statistics to Be Published.

Third-That the Hospital Service of the Revenue Marine shall obtain and publish statistical information of the sanitary con-dition of foreign countries from which contegious and infectious diseases are or may be imported into the United States, and shall publish weekly accounts thereof in the different ports of the United States. Fourth-The bill turther provides for

consular inspection at foreign ports by sani-tary experts in consular offices, who are to supervise the inspection and disinfection of all vessels leaving intected ports. The de-tails as to the compensation and appointment of the sanitary experts are left to be provided for in the sundry civil bill.

Flith-The bill provides that whenever an infected vessel arrives at any port of entry in the United States the Marine Hospital Service may remand said vessel at its (the vessel's) own expense to the nearest national or other quarantine station and treat and disinfect the same; and said vessel shall not be permitted to enter any port of the United States until it is pronounced free from infectious disease or danger of conveying the same.

Sixth-Wherever it shall be shown to the satisfaction of the President that, by reason of the existence of any infectious disease in a foreign country, there is serious danger of the introduction of the same into the United States, then in such case the President may for the time being suspend immigration until all danger from infection

The first package, it will be remem-bered, was shipped by the City National Bank, of this city, to Ball, Hutchins & Co., of Galveston, Tex., and the \$10,000 envel-ope was sent by Kountz Bros., to the Island City Bank, of Galveston. The Wells-Fargo & Co. Express received the packages here and sent them to Cincin-nati where they were transferred to the carried them to Nashville. nati to Louisville the packages were in charge of an Adams messenger named Hardin, and the Wells-Fargo people believe that the money was stolen while in his cus-tody. The Wells-Fargo people intend to hold the Adams people responsible for the thetts, it is said, while the Adams officials do not by any means admit their responsi-bilitebility.

BUBBLES IN THE WATER

Lead the Quakers to Bellevo They Have Found Natural Gas.

NEW YORK, Dec. 28 .- At the bottom of the 30-foot well in the rear of the Darby Library are to be seen millions of globules rising constantly to the surface of the water. Each miniature globe is filled with gassupposed to be natural gas as found in the bowels of the earth west of the Alleghenies. AN EX-PROTHONOTARY CONVICTED.

His Lawyer Relied Only Upon a Legal Quibble to Clear His Client.

LAWCASTER, Dec. 28 .- Ex-Prothonotary John W. Mentzer was put on trial yester-day on a charge of embezzling \$1,233 money collected by him as tax on writs and due th Commonwealth during his last year of office. It was shown that the money was collected by Mentzer and was paid to the State by one of Mentzer's bondsmen after suit was brought against him, who'thus entered the

criminal prosecution. There was no testimony offered for the defense, Mentzer's counsel relying on a legal point raised that the indictment was detective because two distinct criminal charges were embraced in one count of the indictment. The court overruled the point, and the jury convicted Mentzer. The case will be appealed to the Supreme Court.

inas passed. Havann Harbor Constantly Polluted.

Surgeon General Wyman, of the Marine Hospital Service, to-day strongly com-mended the visit of the joint sub-committee of the House and Senate Immigration Committee to Cuba, and thinks that they will gather some valuable information. Havana harbor, he says, is closed, and is the receptacle for the sewage of the mili-tary and other hospitals, at which yellow lever and other diseases are treated, and in consequence is always dangerous, especially in the summer season. The harbor, he says, has irequently been investigated and says, has frequently over intrestigated and reported upon by sanitary experts from this country, and its unhealthy condition established. The danger from disease in the harbor, he says, is so great that the Plant line of steamers, plying between Cuba and Florida, are prohibited from cast-ing another in the barbor by the Elevit ing anchor in the harbor by the Florida laws, and are required to tie to mooring buoys, as it is considered dangerous to holst an anchor aboard which has been imbedded in the mud of Havana harbor. Taliapedra whari, in the narbor, he says,

is so infected with disease that yellow fever invariably breaks out among the crews of vessels that the up there unless the crews are thoroughly acclimated or have had yellow tever before. The sanitary condition of the harbor, he says, could be greatly im-proved by an additional ontlet, which would relieve it of much refuse matter. Besides the poor sanitary condition of Ha-vana harbor, the danger from importing contagious diseases from Cuba is greatly in creased from its close commercial intercourse with Spanish and other ports.

TURNERS ARE KICKING.

They Drait Resolutions Against Restricting Immigration.

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 28.-[Special]-The Executive Committee of the North American Turner Bund, consisting of Henry Braun, John Toenfeldt, Max Hempel and Dr. George Richter, met at the Commercial building and drafted resolutions protesting against the proposed restrictive immigra-tion measures in Congress. They gave many reasons, and claimed it was contrary to American ideas to set up barriers to the development of the country. They will send a message to Congress.
