On motion, the following named gentlemen as Executive Committee whose duty it shall be to organize the several election districts throughout the County, by appointing full and thorough agents of vigilance in the several townships: Sanders, D. Wilcox, V. E. Piollet, Stephen, C. Ward.

The chair appointed a Committee to draft an address to the people of Bradford County, consisting of E. W. Morgan, Wm. Elwell, H. M. Peck, J. M. Wattles and P. C. Ward.

On motion, E. W. Morgan, David Wilcox, E. S. Goodrich and Geo. Sanders were appointed a committee for procuring and circulating proper documents.

Resolved, That a County Mass Meeting of Democracy of Bradford County be held at Smithfield on Thursday the 15th day of July next, and that our democratic citizens be invited and earnestly requested to attend. Meeting will be addressed by some of the able and eloquent speakers of the day.

Bradford County Corresponding Committee, also a mass meeting of the democracy be held at Athens on the second day of July at 12 o'clock, M. The democracy are requested to make a general rally at that time.

That the Corresponding Committee meet again at the Exchange in Towanda on Wednesday the 17th day of July at 10 o'clock, M. It is hoped that every member of the committee will feel it his duty to attend at that time.
