31. He is insolent and vindictive with his opponents.  
32. He is for amending the constitution as to deprive the President of the power.  
33. He has united himself with Daniel Webster, and all the leading Hartford Convention federalists.  
34. His character, habits, and disposition are too much like those of the leaders of the French Revolution.  
35. In his speech, to which Mr. Rich-  
Vermont, replied, February 17, 1820,  
said: "If gentlemen will not allow  
to have black slaves, they must let  
white ones, for we cannot cut  
through, and black our shoes, and  
our wives and daughters work in  
the kitchen."  
36. He is opposed to all measures for  
speedy settlement of the new states,
