

Hugh O'Hara, to pay a fine of \$100 to the Commonwealth, and the court refused to grant a writ of habeas corpus. The sentence was deferred until the next term. The Commonwealth vs. the court discharged the defendant from the trial, and sentenced him to pay a fine of five dollars, and the sentence one of ten dollars, and the sentence of prosecution. Saturday Sept. 14th, '44. Ramsdel vs. Hiram Horton. This was an action of assumpsit for money had and received &c., brought by the defendant for passing counterfeit bills on the Bank, Rhode Island. These facts were:— Ramsdel owed Horton a hundred dollars; Horton owed Mills nine dollars; Horton ten dollars, and requested him to pay the hundred dollars to Ramsdel. He did so, and the bills paid was this twenty dollar bill, which proved to be bad, and Horton refused to take back. The defence set up was, that there was not that privity between the parties that would entitle the plaintiff to maintain his action against Horton. Being a legal question it was agreed to make a case stated for the opinion of the Court. The decision will not be given till next Term. We will speak of it more particularly when decided. On motion and filing the certificate of the clerk of the county court of New Britain county Connecticut, Henry Booth was to-day duly admitted to practice as an Attorney of the Several Courts of Bradford County.

In Troy village, on Saturday September 14th, 1844, Dr. O. VAN DUSEN.  
The subject of this notice came to his death in a truly tragical manner. While some citizens of Troy, and adjoining townships were erecting a Hickory pole on the afternoon of Saturday last; the top of a pole that had been previously erected and broken off and was still suspending at the place where it was broken suddenly gave way and came down, striking the deceased on the head and causing his immediate death. The deceased had been very active in making preparations for raising the pole and was aiding at the time the ill-fated blow came upon him. In his death our community has suffered an irreparable loss, and it will be long ere an affectionate remembrance of him will fade away. It is seldom that we have the peace of our village so corroded as at the time the above melancholy catastrophe transpired. When persons fall a prey to sickness and terminate their earthly career by protracted disease, the minds of surviving friends become resigned to their fate, for we reflect upon the dissolution about to take place and meet it comparatively without a murmur, from seeing it in prospective. But when the fiat of death is hurled without any precursor, when we see one in the full tide of health and a season of meriment suddenly laid low by the iron scythe of death it produces a paralysis upon the minds of all, and they arouse from their lethargy only to realize that the brittle thread upon which human life is suspended too often breaks when least expected. None but those who have seen the Tomb close suddenly and forever over a form we once knew and loved, can realize the sad certainty and appreciate the inscrutable cause of danger. It seems like some terrific dream that comes across a troubled imagination and we flatter ourselves that in a lucid moment it may disperse the gloom, but stern reality is stamped upon it; and time only confirms the truth that no assurance is given for the tenure of human life. And in and by said act, I am further directed to give notice "that every person excepting justices of the peace, who shall hold any office or appointment of profit and trust under the government of the United States, or of this state, or of any city or incorporated district, whether a commissioned officer or agent who is, or shall be employed under the legislative, executive or judicial department of this state, or of United States, or of any incorporated district, and also every member of Congress, and of the state Legislature, and of the select or common council of any city, or commissioners of any incorporated district, is, by law, incapable of holding or exercising, at the same time, the office or appointment of judge, inspector or clerk of any election of this Commonwealth, and that no inspector, judge or other officer of any such election, shall be then eligible to any office to be voted for.  
By the 4th section of an act passed the 16th day of April, 1840, it is provided, "that the 13th section of the act passed July 2d, 1839, entitled "an act relating to the election of this Commonwealth," shall not be so construed, as to prevent any militia officer from serving as judge, inspector or clerk, at any general or special election of this Commonwealth.  
In the 61st section of the act first mentioned it is enacted, that "every general and special election shall be open between eight and ten in forenoon and shall continue without interruption or adjournment until seven o'clock in the evening, when the polls shall be closed.  
It is further directed, that the meeting of the Judges at the Court House, in the borough of Towanda, to make out the general return, shall be on the third day after the election, which will be on the 11th day of October.  
The conferees of this Congressional district will meet at the Court House in the borough of Towanda, on the seventh day after the election, which will be on the 15th day of October.  
Given under my hand at the borough of Towanda, the 2d day of September, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty four, and of the independence of the United States the sixty-ninth.
