

The Bank Question.

It is claimed for Henry Clay, that he is a "great Statesman," but if his friends have no other proof of this assertion, then the constant wavering and changing of his whole political career, and these proofs must be poor indeed; for we had always thought that the qualities for a great statesman consisted of a clear and comprehensive power of mind; a power sufficient to trace every cause to effect; and to grasp and reveal truths as they really exist. But never will, without prejudice, care to review his political course, cannot conclude that he has been the most consummate demagogue that has ever been on our country. We appeal to

Clay opposed to a Bank.

Notes in Congress from 1811, to 1816.

This vagrant power to erect a whole Constitution in quest of some trivial spot whereupon to fasten, been at length located; by the general from Georgia, on that provision which authorizes Congress to lay and collect taxes, &c. In 1791, the power referred to one part of the instrument, in 1811, to another. Sometimes it is alleged to be deducible from the power to regulate commerce. Hard pressed here, it disappears, and shows itself under the grant to coin money.—

The sagacious Secretary of the Treasury, in 1791, pursued the wisest course; has taken shelter behind general, high and imposing terms.

"He has declared, in the preamble to the act establishing the bank, that it will be very conducive to the success-
ful conducting of the national finances; will lead to give facility to the obtaining of loans; and will be productive of considerable advantage to trade and industry in general. No allusion is made to the collection of taxes. What
the nature of this Government? It is emphatically federal—vested with aggregate of specified powers for general purposes, conceded by existing sovereignties, who have themselves retained what is not so conceded.

The power to charter com-
panies IS NOT specified in the grant,

I contend, is of a nature not trans-
ferrable by mere implication. It is one of the most exalted attributes of govern-
ment. In the exercise of this GIGANTIC power, we have seen an East India Company created, which has caused dismay, desolation, and DEATH, throughout one of the largest portions of the habitable world."

It is a corporation, such as the bill creates; It is a splendid association of FAVORED individuals. But corporations enjoy exclusive privi-
leges which no others possess.—

If you create fifty corporations instead of one, you have only fifty privi-
leged bodies instead of one. I contend
the States have the EXCLUSIVE power to regulate contracts, to de-
termine the value of money, &c.—[See History U. S. Bank p. 44.]

The next consideration which in him to oppose the renewal of the charter, was that he believed the nation had, during a portion of its existence, abused its power, and had sought to subserve the views of a political party.
