DAVID F. BARSTOW vs. JOB KIRBY. This was an action of debt on a promissory note in the following terms: \$300.—Ninety days after date, I promise to pay to the order of J. P. Kirby, at the Towanda Bank, three hundred dollars without defalcation, for value received.

Towanda, Dec. 23, 1841.

B. COOLBAUGH.

This promissory note was delivered by Coolbaugh to Kirby, and Kirby, before the note became due, endorsed and delivered it to the Towanda Bank; and the Towanda Bank, before the same became due, endorsed and delivered it to D. F. Barstow.

This was one of many other notes assigned to D. F. Barstow on the 15th Jan. 1842, and a question arose as to the validity of this assignment.

The defendant by his counsel, contended that this assignment was made for the benefit of the Bank, and that he was ready, and had been ready ever since the note became due, to pay it in full to the Towanda Bank.

The Court held the assignment valid, and directed the Jury to find for the plaintiff; which was accordingly done. FEB. 15, 1845.

PETER ALLEN vs. JOSEPH ALLEN.—

This was an action on the guaranty of a note dated May 18th, 1842, given by George A. Mix to Joseph Allen, and by Joseph transferred to Peter, with a guaranty of its being good.

The defendant introduced testimony to show that the plaintiff made an agreement with Mix to wait on him longer than by the terms of the note, he would be bound to do, and on this ground contended that he was released from all liability. The Jury found for the defendant.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18, 1845.

Mr. Choate's great speech on Annexation—A Crowded Gallery—The New Cabinet—Mr. Buchanan probably at its head—Mr. Walker to the Treasury—A sweep in the Offices—Mr. Tyler has taken lodgings—Long John Wentworth outdone—A question of Etiquette.

The most classical and finished speech on the question of Annexation, made at this session, was delivered today by Mr. Choate. His distinguished reputation attracted even a larger audience, were it possible, than any that previously attended the debate, and so intense was the anxiety to hear him that the galleries were thronged one hour before the meeting of the Senate.

The ladies, whose presence is a good criterion of the fame and quality of the speaker, paid Mr. Choate the high compliment of a hasty toilet and an early attendance, and in their usual gracious manner expelled every thing of masculine complexion from either the comfort or convenience of hearing the speech. Such was the extraordinary interest manifested on the occasion by "Heaven's last best gift," that but two bearded faces were visible in the large semi-circular gallery, and they stood out as a sort of forbidden fruit in the political Eden.

Mr. Choate devoted himself mainly to the investigation of the Constitution, objections, and therefore was more solid than eloquent. His was a powerful, not a brilliant effort. It enchaind the reason without exciting the passion of the listener. As a speaker he is capable of the highest intellectual elevation, being one of the most accomplished scholars and universally read of our public men. He may in fact be styled the belles-lettres statesman of the times, being without a superior at home or abroad. Like most who come from the East he lacks the fire and energy which give effect and power to eloquence. But he is, at times, strikingly sublime, without ever being impressively grand as an orator. Having every advantage of cultivation and unerring industry and study, he is the most ready and most perfect of the great public debaters.

I have no doubt in my own mind that the Cabinet is now fully determined upon, but will not be revealed, for reasons of State and other important considerations, until—near the 4th of March. If the formation of the new government was now proclaimed, even a Cabinet Minister would be inundated with applications and beset with the most annoying importunity every hour all the period of his instalment. From every credible source, I learn that Mr. Buchanan was tendered the Department of State on Saturday, which was confirmed at a special interview and accepted this morning. There are also some indications that Mr. Walker will be invited to the Treasury. If the first appointment is made, the other seems more than probable.

The appearances, and the impressions of those best informed, incline me to the belief that there will be a general sweep in the offices here and elsewhere. I see how it will be possible for Mr. Polk to resist the pressure that will

be made in the name of the party. If he does, he will surprise many and disappoint not a few.

Mr. Tyler has engaged apartments at Fuller's Hotel, for his occupancy after the 3d of March, where it is supposed that he will lead a much more undisturbed life, than in his days of power and Presidency.

The Senate, determined not to be excelled by the House in the dimensions of its humanity, is soon to be graced by the presence of a successor to Mr. Henderson, Judge Speight, originally of North Carolina, who can beat long John Wentworth some four inches in height, and is in every way a better proportioned man. He is, by all odds, the tallest specimen of a Congressman ever sent to the halls of legislation.

There has been a good deal of etiquette war going on between the President elect and the President in fact, as to which of them should make the first ceremonious call, and up to this hour I understand that visits have not been exchanged. The ladies took the thing in hand to adjust a compromise, and Madame Tyler drove up in her state equipage to make Mrs. Polk a call as a stranger—not as the President elect. Really, this is getting to be a very great country, and by and by, as we grow older, more aristocratic, and have wiped out the rust of our forefathers' anvil, it will be necessary to send over to Mrs. Victoria for the Court system of the laws of etiquette observed between the reigning and expectant Queen.
