

RHODE ISLAND.—Mr. Brownell, of Rhode Island, has introduced a bill in the Legislature, granting a General Amnesty to Dorr, and all imprisoned with him. The Providence Gazette says: "The introduction of the Amnesty and Restoration Bill, in the Senate yesterday, by Mr. Brownell, of South Kingsbury, shows conclusively that the liberal Whigs do not merely deal in promises. The prompt action of one of their most prominent men in this matter, is worthy of all praise. Mr. Dorr will be without doubt a free man, in the course of a few hours, and we shall hail the event and harbinger of a return of our people to peace and tranquility."

We regret to state the anticipations of the Gazette have not been realized, as we have received information since the above was in type, that the Legislature of Rhode Island adjourned without meeting the persecuted Dorr, to meet again in Newport on the fourth Monday of June.

The Act of Amnesty introduced in the Senate was referred to a select committee, consisting of Lieut. Gov. Diman, of Bristol, John H. Weeden, of North Providence and Joseph Smith of Warren, with instructions to report in June. The vote on the reference was 18 to 14. In the House a Resolution was introduced by Fenner Brown to appoint a committee to prepare a Bill providing for the Liberation of Dorr. The Resolution was laid on the table by a vote of 28 to 28.

An act was passed liberating Messrs. Bosworth and Heath on their taking oath of allegiance.

HEADED.—John M. Botts, who tried to head Captain Tyler, was defeated for Congress, at the late election in Virginia.

HENDRICK B. WRIGHT'S appointment as Treasurer of the Mint, at Philadelphia, has not been officially announced.
