D. 1846. States, whenever, in his opinion the public exigency shall require it to have completed and put in commission all vessels now on the stocks, and to purchase such naval stores and ordnance as may be necessary to fit them out. The bill appropriates \$5.625,000 for building the 10 steam-vessels; 62,920,000 to complete vessels on the stocks; \$1,520,000 for repairs; \$625,000 for stores, and \$500,000 for ordnance.
