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TOWANDA ACADEMY.

THE next academic year of this institution, will commence on Monday, the first day of September, under the superintendence and management of Mr. J. C. Vandercreek, as Principal.

Students from abroad can find board with the Principal or others, on reasonable terms.

Lectures will be given regularly by the Principal and others, on the most important topics of education, and a society organized for the special benefit of young men. There will be two examinations and exhibitions during the year, the time to be determined by the teachers and trustees.
