Of Gen. Taylor's movements we have of anthentic information since he departed from Marin in pursuit of Urrea. The Mexicans here have a report that he overtook Urrea, who rave him battle and cut up his command conalderably. Very improbable. We are not positive as to the number of men Gen. Taylor has with him, but hear it stated as not exceed ing 700, with one battery, three six pounders. Even with this small force, he will render a good account of Urrea if he succeed in bringing him to an engagement. There has been no boat down from Camargo for two days, else probably later intelligence would have been received.

In addition to the above, the New Orleans leaving Matamoras, news was brought in by a Mexican that shortly after General Taylor's leaving Marin, the vanguard of the division under his command came up with the rear guard of the forces under Urrea and Canales, and a hot engagement ensued, in which the American troops were, for a short time, severely handled. until the main body, under the immediate command of Gen. Taylor, came up, when the Mexicans were forced to retreat, with great loss
