Bacful Information for Children.

WHETHER OF LARGER OR SMALLER GROWTH .-NUMBER WIL

There is enother peculiarity in the form of English dates previous to the change of style, which is often met with, and being another source of error, in American history, needs explanation.

You often see on old tomb-Stones, and sometimes in baoks such dates as the following :--January 15th 1691, -Feb. 24th 1730, -March 10th 17th, -last figure or two figures of the year being placed in a fractional form, or sometimes thus 1693-4; 1730-31; 1749-50, The meaning and the reason are easily given.

By the act of Parliament in 1751, eltering the Style, the commencement of the Civil year in that kingdom, was also changed ; so as to correspond with that of the Calendar. If applied to the Civil year, it meant the year that would close on the 24th of March following .-But if it was designed for the Calendar year, it vious December ; because, on the last day of that December, the Calendar year 1623 was completed. Thus in every such date, there might be a différence of from 8 to almost 12 months. To avoid this, the above (ractional mode of indicating dates in January, February and March, was adopted, which rendered them perfectly definite and intelligible. Thus Jan. 15th 1623-4 means, 1623 in the Civil year, which would end on the 24th of March following; but 1624 of the Calendar year," which had commenced with the 1st of that month January. It is scarcely necessary to remind you, that this peculiarity is confined to January, Febuary and March, to the 24th day; as that is the only portion of the year included in different Civil years. It may however be added, that occaaionally, we find the same form of date applied to the last 7 days of December. Thus, I have now before me, an old diary containing the following date. "December 25th 1741-2," and you will readily perceive the reason. The writer evidently considered the true year A. D. as commencing with Christmas, (the following supposed day of the Saviour's birth.) but the Civil year extended, is before, to the 25th of the following March. He meant, therefore, that it was the 25th of December in the Civil year 1741; but the 1st day of the year 1642 reckoned from the supposed birth of the Saviour. You have an exact illustration of this same difference, in comparing the year of the Independence of the United States. with that of the Calendar. The Declaration of Independence was made July 4th 1788. The year 1847 is then, the 71st year of that era, and so it will remain according to the Calandar, to the end of the year, But after the 4th of next .'n y. it will be the 72nd year of our national existence. Hence the present Calendar year is the 71 or 71-2 of of our Independence : that is, the 71st till the 4th of July next, and the 72nd to the close of the year. This will enable you to understand a great many dates, that might, otherwise, he unintelligible. 
