

From the Seat of War.

From the Seat of War. The following news, received at Philadelphia this morning, was transmitted to the Herald of this city by the news of the 21st inst. It is a fact that there had been a skirmish between the Mexican and American armies, and the Mexicans propose a suspension of hostilities to receive the propositions of Mr. Trist.

On the 21st inst. the New Orleans Phoenix received the following highly important information, which arrived by the steamer Fashion, which left Vera Cruz on the 27th of August and arrived on the 19th.

The news by this arrival is the most important we have received in many months from Mexico. Our army has not only advanced to the City of Mexico, but it has had two engagements with the enemy, close under the walls of the City, and the Mexicans have been brought to terms, and we have applied a suspension of arms—and Gen. Scott granted it.

The Mexican Congress has been convoked to take into consideration Mr. Trist's propositions. The news was received in Vera Cruz on the evening of the 26th ult. by an express courier from Mexico, who brought down the following letter to the Hon. the collector of Vera Cruz, to whose office we are indebted for its use:

OTIZABA, Aug. 25, 1847. My DEAR FRIEND:—The Mexican mail, which just came in, brought the following intelligence from the Diario Oficial del Gobierno. Did you this by an express courier who will be here to-morrow about 12 o'clock.

On the 20th, two brigades, commanded by Gen. Escobedo and Santa Anna, went out to attack the Mexicans near Los Llanos de Sanjel. Gen. Escobedo's division has been completely defeated, and Santa Anna, after the first encounter, fled in disorder to the City—they immediately asked for a suspension of hostilities, and offered to hear the proposition of peace from the Mexicans.

The next day the Minister of Foreign Relations sent the next Congress, through the newspaper press for that purpose. These are the great facts, which, no doubt, will settle the peace.

An express arrived in Vera Cruz on the 26th ult. with letters containing the same news in substance and the following translation of the announcement of it in the Diario Oficial del Gobierno. The news of the 21st inst. arrived at Tacumbura, and was known as the news of the 21st inst. The Mexicans went out to attack the Americans near Los Llanos de Sanjel, and were completely defeated. Santa Anna, with another division, which he had brought down from the City, immediately retreated to the City, in disorder, and such was the panic created by the defeat that the Minister of Foreign Relations immediately convoked the Congress, to take into consideration Mr. Trist's proposition. A suspension of arms was demanded by the Mexicans, and the Americans are around Mexico, but had not yet entered the city on the 21st inst. We have the meager details which we have of important events.

Counters from General Scott's army direct to be able to get through, so far as we can be from the foregoing statement it is manifest that Gen. Scott holds the City of Mexico at his mercy.
