

DEATH OF MR. HAYNT—We learn by the Monmouth (N. J.) Democrat, of Thursday last, that the Hon. Thomas G. Haynt died at Col's Neck, on the morning of the 1st inst., of typhus fever.

He was seized with the disease which terminated his life, on the 29th of August, and his wife with the same complaint, the following day. They had just returned from a visit to some relatives in the West, and had enjoyed their journey to a high degree, and reached home in what they considered unusually good health. But in the midst of life we are in death.

Mrs. Mix had long been a professor of the religion of Christ, and she had adorned her profession by a corresponding walk and conversation. Her death, like her life, was the strongest recommendation of that religion, which a frail mortal can give. From the first of her illness, she manifested no anxiety in regard to her issue, but on the contrary, enjoyed a peaceful and even joyous assurance that all would be well. Her conversation was not only spiritual—it was heavenly; and the last words she was understood to utter, was an ascription of glory to God, to whom she had consecrated her life, and to whom now in death she cheerfully commended her spirit. Verily, "The righteous hath hope in death."
