## To Prepare Bones for Manure,

As mills for grinding bones are very costly, it is a great desideratum for the farmer to know how he can otherwise prepare them for his crops. By the following simple method he can reduce them to a tine powder and increase their value four fold.

Take one hundred pounds of bones and place them in a kettle, or in an old tub unfit for further use, or ever in a hollow scooped in the ground and made tight by lining with clay. Next take from thirty to thirty-five paineds of oil of vitriol (sulphric acid.) mixed with one third to one half his weight of water, and pour over the bones. In a day or two, the bones will dissolve into a liquid paste, to which there must be added; by stirring in, wood ashes or fine mould, until it is of the consistency of thick mortar. Put the mixture away from rain, and in a few weeks it will become a light dry powder, which may pe applied by the hand or otherwise, to any kind of land that may require it. In preparing this mixture, great care must be observed to keep the oil of v triol from touching the clothes or skin, as it will burn them as badly as fire.

The oil of vitriol, for this mixture, must be of a first rate quality, otherwise it would require a greater quantity than given above to dissolve one hundred lbs. of bones. The mixture answers best for a turnip crop; but is highly valuable for other roots as well as for grass and grain. It should be applied at the rate of twenty to forty bushels to the acre sown broadcast on grass land, in the spring, or, on grain and turnin crops after harrowing in the seed. For garden or field crops planted in rows or drills, as roots, corn, beans, peas &c., it may be applied in the hills or rows at the time of sowing, or it may afterwards sprinkle around the plants at the time of hoeing .- Imerican Farmer.

THIN SOWING .- In England the question has Seen discussed whether thick or thin seeding was Cantonthe most profitable. This is a question equally important on this side of the Atlantic. We have but little doubt that the practice of thick seeding has had as many advocates as abroad.

A triend of ours who is a good farmer receonsmends thick seeding for the purpose of preventing the numerous secondary stalks; which can never be so strong, healthy and productive as the main stem, which thistgises from the seed. That thick seeding has the effect to prevent tillering out as it is termed, is supported by observations. There is more food for the few stalks which may grow together, than to the many which are often formed where the seeding is thin .- Farmer and Mechanic.

THE CULTURE OF STRAWBERRIES .- A - writer in one of our exchanges remarks fulls it not most singular that so few provide themselves with a plentiful crop of this very earliest and most delicious fruit! Most no doubt, are deterred by supposed difficulty. and cost of culture. But by the following process. an acre of strawberries may be kept in the finest bearing condition for any length of time, at no more cost than to cultivate an acre of corn, after the first setting out has been done.

Set out the plants in rows about three feet apart. and a foot apart in the rows. Keep them clean and well cultivated, by a horse attached to a plow or cultivator, and in a year or two they will bear abundantly. In a year or two more, the plantation will want renewing: to do which let the runners fill up the space between the rows, which has before been kent clean and in fine condition, and then plow under the old rows, leaving a strip of plants formed by the runners between them for new rows with the horse, as before; and so indefinitely.


