CHOLERA IN WESTERN PENNSTLVANIA.—The Beaver Argus denies the existence of cholera at

the disease to resident citizens at any point higher up than Cincinnati. On the 24th ult., the Brilliant brought up a man from that city, who was landed in a dying state, and subsequently buried. On Saturday, the Beacon passed up with several cases on board, having also buried several on the upward trip; but the report circulating rapidly in Pittsburg, caused great alarm, she was driven from the wharf, and returned to Beaver, with one or two dead bodies on board. The disease is on the increase below, and all the boats from that quarter will have more or less of it aboard."

An Important Case Decided.—The suit of the commonwealth against the Delaware and Hudson Canal Company, to recover \$75,000, the amount of taxes upon dividends, has been determined in favor of the Company. The grounds assumed by the defence were that the State of Pennsylvania had, not the power to tax dvidends declared by a company incorporated by a sister State although a portion of the works may be located in the State so taxing, as that would be an infrigement of a compact between the States—a principle tested by the verdict.
