THE FIVE POINTS in New York is known every where as one of the most-pestilent spots in the Union; and lying, as it does, in the heart of the great city of New York, the wonder has long been that it be permitted to exist. For a number of years efforts have been made to remove it, without effect for the reason that the owners of property there find it more profitable to maintain it as it is, than it could be by any change they could make. The tents derived from these dens of misery are said to be enormous; and, as almost every resident has to pay a small sum, the aggregate may be judged of by the following statement which we find in the

Courier and Enquirer;
In a single building, called Chimney Sweeper's
Hall, in the rear of No. 7 Little Water street there are 200 colored people. On one of the corners of Orange and Cross streets, there are 95 colored and pro-titules in a basement and a rear building At a place known as No. 23, there are 80 females of the same class and of all colors. At Nos 10 and 12 Mulberry street, there are about 800 persons living on two lots. Nos 142, 144, and 148, are all houses of ill-fame, and contain nearly 100 persons each. At 95 Cross street there are 52 male inmates 75 females and 135 children—in all 262 human beings in a single house. These facts furnish an index of the general character of locality. These people, thus crowded together are without excep-tion the offscouring of the city—the very refuse of a filth and vice. Most of them have gone thither from more respectable portions of the city, when they have become too degraded to live elsewhere It is the common sink for poisoned and pestilential carcass that have become too offensive to be toler- ed to attend. ated in any other quarter.

THE FLOOD ON RED RIVER.—We hear distressing accounts of the flood on Red River, and the immense elestruction of property occasioned thereby.

An Extra from the Republican represents the rise of the water as unprecedented. With the exception of a few elevations, all the illuvial lands on both sides of the Red River, Bayous Robert and Rapides, and perhaps Bayou Bouff, have been covered and are still submerged. As the front proprietors made no calculation for such an unexampled rise, ley were not prepared for such an emergency, and their loss has been very severe. The suffer-ing on the river above is represented to be even worse. Alexandria has been damaged very matenally; many of the houses are undermined, and others will be before the water recedes. The loss to Rapides Parish alone, estimating the Cotton crop at 25,000 bales, and the Sugar crop at 10,000 hids with the usual amount of Molasses, will reach \$3,

The Extra adds: It is impossible to estimate the loss by the flood in the valley of Red River. Instead of upward of 25,000 this parish will not produce 2.000 bales. In the valley, instead of upward of 130.000 bales not 30,000 will be made. The loss in this article will be \$5,000,000, which is nothing to the loss of the crop of com, of stock of farming implements, the destruction of improvements, and general breaking up of plantations.— N. O. Com. Bulletin, 24th.
