ON THE SUBJECT OF CALIFORNIA.

To the House of Representatives of the United States:—I transmit to the House of Representatives, in answer to the resolution of that body, passed on the 21st of December last, the accompanying re-ports of Heads of Departments, which contain all the official information in the possession of the Executive asked for by the resolution.

On coming into office, I found the military commandant of the department of Chilifornia exercising the functions of a civil Governor in that Territory and left, as I was, to act under the treaty of Guadaloupe Hidalgo, without the aid of any legislative provision, establishing a government in that Territory, I thought it best not to disturb the arrangement nade under my predecessor, until Congress should take some action on the subject. 'I therefore did not interfere with the powers of the military commandant, who continued to exercise the functions civil Governor, as before; but I made no such appointment, conferred no such authority, and have increased compensation to the com mandant for his services.

With a view to the faithful execution of the treaty, so tat as lay in the power of the Executive, and to enable Congress to act at the present session with as full knowledge and as little difficulty as possible on all matters of interest in these territories, I sent the Hor. Thomas Butler King, as bearer of des-patches to California, and certain officers to Califor. nia and New Mexico, whose duties are particularly defined in the accompanying letters of instruc-tion addressed to them severally by the proper de-

I did not hesitate to express to the people of those territories my desire, that each territory should, it prepared to comply with the requisitions of the Constitution of the United States, form a plan of a State Constitution, and submit the same to Congress, with a prayer for admission into the Union as a State; but I did not anticipate, suggest, nor authorize, the establishment of any such Government. without the assent of Congress, nor did I authorize any government agent or officer to interfere with nor exercise any influence or control over the election of delegates, or over any convention, in making or modifying their domestic institutions, or any of the provisions of their proposed Constitution; on the contrary, the instructions given by my orders were, that all measures of domestic policy must originate solely with themselves—that while the Executive was desirous to protect and defend them in the formation of any government, republican in its character, to be at the proper time submitted to Congress—yet it was to be distinctly understood that the plan of such a government must, at the same time, be the result of their own deliberate choice, and originated with themselves, without the merference of the Executive.

I am unable to give any information as to laws passed by any supposed government in California. or of any census taken in either of the territories mentioned in the resolution, as I have no information on these subjects, as already stated. I have existed under my predecessor. In endorsing an early application by the people of the territories for an earnest desire to afford to the wisdom and patriotism of Congress the opportunity of avoiding an-gry dissensions among the people of the United

Under the Constitution every State has the right of establishing, and, from time to time, altering its municipal laws and domestic institutions, independently of every other State, and of the general govemment, subject only to the propositions and guarantees expressly set forth in the Constitution of the United States. The subjects thus left exclusively to the respective States, were not designed or expected to become topics of national agitation. Still, the territories of the United States.

Every new acquisition of territory has led to discussions on the question, whether the system of involuntary servitude, which prevails in many of the States should or should not, be prohibited in that terntory? The periods of excitement from this cause, which have heretofore occurred, have been safely pa-sed; but during the interval of whatever length which may elapse before the admission of the territories ceded by Mexico, as States, it appears probable that similar excitement will prevail ue extent. Under these circumstances thought, and still think, that it was my duty to findeavor to put it in the power of Congress, by the admission of California and New Mexico as States, to remove all occasion for the unnecessary agitation of the public mind. It is understood that the people of the western part of California have formed a plan of a State Constitution, and will soon sub-int the same to the judgment of Congress, and apply for admission as a state. This course, on their part, though in accordance with my wish, was not adopted exclusively in consequence of any expression of my wishes, inasmuch as measures tending to this end had been promoted by the officers sent there by my predecessor, and were already in active progress of execution before any communica-tion from me reached California. If the proposed constitution shall, when submitted to Congress, be tound-to be in compliance with the requisitions of the constitution of the United States, I earnestly recommend that it may teceive the sanction of Con-

The part of California not included in the proposed State of that name, is believed to be uninhabited, except in a settlement of our countrymen

in the vicinity of Salt Lake. A claim has been advanced by the State of Texas to a very large portion of the most populous dis-frict of the territory commonly designated by the name of New Mexico. If the people of New Mexico had formed a plan of State government for that Territory, as ceded by the treaty of Guadaloupe Hidago, and had been admitted by Congress as a State, our constitution would have afforded the means of obtaining an adjustment of the question of boundary with Texas to a judicial decision. At present, however, no judicial tribunal has the power of deciding that question, and it remains for Congress to devise some mode for its adjustment.

Meanwhile, I submit to Congress the question, whether it would be expedient, before such adjustment, to establish a territorial government, which, by including the district so claimed, would practially decide the question adversely to the State of Texas-excluding it, would decide it in her favor. la my opinion such a course would not be expedient; especially as the people of this territory still enjoy the benefit and protection of their municipal laws, originally derived from Mexico, and have a military force stationed there to protect them against the Initians. It is and outstedly true, that the property, lives, liberty and religion of the people of New Mexico, are better protected than they ever were before the treaty of session. Should Congress, when California shall present herself for interest of the congress, when California shall present herself for interest the congress of this stablishment conducted upon fires, when California shall present herself for interest conducted upon fair and bonest principles. You have our thanks for corporation into the Union, annex a condition to her alimission as a State affecting her domestic institutions, contrary to the wishes of her people, and even compel her temporarily to comply with it, yet the State could change her constitution at any time after admission, when to her it should seem expedient. It is to be expected any attempt to deny to the people of the State the right of self-government, m a matter which peculiarly affects themselves, will intallibly be regarded by them as an invasion of their rights; and upon the principle laid down in our own Declaration of Independence, they will certainly be sustained in their resistance against it by the great mass of the American people. To asser that they are a conquered people, and must submit to the will of their conquerors in this regard, will meet with no cordist response among American force.

Great numbers of them are our own countrymen, not interior to the rest in intelligence and patriotism, and no language of menace to restrain them in the exercise of an undoubted right, substantially guaranted to them by treaty of cosmon itself, shall ever be uttered by me, or encouraged and sustained by persons acting under my authority. It is to be expected, that in the residue of the territory ceded to us by Mexico, the people residing there will, at the time of their incorporation into the Union as a
