

The Last Woman.—The Mining Register, Toronto, informs us that there is a prospect on the water-curve in east from three feet in diameter. The fall, being 600 ft. 90 miles is considered sufficient, and the coal being less than a third of the distance, it is thought that the two-thirds of the water will be the right proportion.
