Without a knowledge of first principles nothing can be expected from the attempts of any one whether laboring in this, or any other science, but those who are acquainted with first principles, are seldom known to deviate from them, because they are usually found to be correct. This then is the foundation of Agriculture Notwithstanding farming is yet so imperient, though so many, centuries have elapsed since man was ordered by his Maker to cultivate the earth, while in the mean time so much has been written on this subject, there are many yet living who I hope may derive benefit from the efforts I now make to clear their minds and explain their duties to them; Firstly, (as we all know.) industry and attention are requisite to success in this, as well as all other occupations, but to the work of a farmer more particularly, for it has truly been compared to a hoop— a has no

> The real business of a hubbandman is not merely to drive a plough, to sow grain, or to engage in the other menial offices of a farm, but if is to superintend the labor, to record its results, to contrive the means of its disposition, to read, and think, to attend the markets, and observe the actions of the other farmers around him. He must drain his wet land, for without this process he cannot use it, and after this he should apply manure to the soil which will promote the growth of natural grasses, until the land is in a proper state to receive grain. All his fields should be kept clean, and all the hollows filled up, and leveled. This gives it a neat appear ance, and when in crop it presents one of the most beautiful sights in nature. Whereas, on the contrary, nothing disgusts a person more than to see a farm going to ruin for want of proper attention -Here a pond or marsh undrained-there, a hollow tilled with rank grass, shrubs, and weeds, and the edges of the fences lined with briars, &c. Manores will always fail in effect if not applied at the p.oper time, and the ground is not prepared for its reception. A change, or judicious rotation of crops is also necessary to strengthen and refresh the soil. because some crops impoverish the land much more than others, and like the human body, the Willey Frinklin. ground requires rest. Unless this practice is well understood, and attended to, much land will be destroyed, and the labors of the farmer will prove abortive. It has always been a rule among good farmers, that not more than two exhausting crons be taken from a field before a return is made to it by manure, clover, or silent rest, but I caution every agriculturist never to pasture land directly after any | The same, with Wells' Grammar, Adams' heavy crop has been removed from it.

In fixing on a rotation, a farmer ought to ascertain what particular grains are suited to the soil of his own farm, and in what succession they should follow each other to ensure to him the greatest profit, and at the same time by degrees to improve the land. The same crop which at one time, under certain circumstances and conditions of the ground, would prove unprofitable, may cometimes be very valuable underta different state of affairs. Selecting and propagating the best heads and ears of grain is the surest way of preserving them in perfection. Seeds should be selected with the same care which every farmer bestows in the choice of breeding caule. "Liberality is the economy of Agriculture," whether in procuring tools, seeds, out-houses, or any of the other numerous necessities of a farm. Foresight is another useful item in the proper management of a farm. It is to prepare work for all weather, and doing the right kind of work at the right time, besides doing it well, so operation. As I said before "Liberality is the economy of Agriculture." I perhaps should explain its true meaning; but not wishing to extend my essay to an uninteresting length, I will now in a few words say it is liberality to treat your laborers well, to manure your land bountifully, to feed your animals well, and to be careful to have all your mensils in good order. Great profits depend upon great labor and improvement, and a miseriy farmer can never expeciathis.

Cutting Grass and Curing Hay.

This must depend on the kinds of grass cultiva ted. Timothy affords nearly double the quantity of nutriment, it cut after the seed has formed, instead of while in flower, and it is then much more relished by horses and a portion of the stock. This grass, therefore, should never be cut for them, except when the seed is formed. The proper time for harvesting is between the milk and dough state, when it will nearly ripen after cutting. Orchard grass, on the other hand, although possessing two sevenths more nutritive value for hav in the seed yet it is more tender, and much preferred by stock, when cut in flower, and as it continues to grow rapidly afterward, it should be cut at that time .-Even a few lays will make an important difference in the value of grass, when cut for hay. The kind of grass, and the stock to which it is to be fed cannot, therefore, be too closely noted, to denote the precise moment when the grass will best sub serve the purpose for which it was intended.

Clover should be cut after having fully blossomed and assumed a brownish hoe. By close cutting more forage is secored, and the clover afterward springs more rapidly and evenly. The swath unless very heavy, ought never to be stirred open, but allowed to wilt on the top. It may then be carefully turned over, and when thus partially cured placed in high, slender cocks. and remain till sufficiently dry to remove into the bain. Clover may be housed in a much greener state, by spreading evenly over it in the mow from ten to quarts of salt per ton. Some aid a bushel, but this more than is either necessary for the clover or judicions for the stock consuming it; as the purgative effects of too much salt induce a wasteful consumption of the lorage. A mixture of alternate layers of dry straw with the clover, by absorbing its juices, answers the same purpose, while it materi ally improves the flavor of the straw for folder.


