**Impoverishing the Earth.**

We read in the book of Genesis that after God had created man, he commanded him, among other things, to "replenish the earth." We have long since thought, that notwithstanding the many evidences that we see every hand, of increasing prosperity, agriculturally he impoverishes the earth most essentially, instead of "replenishing" it.

Our views and belief in this respect have been very much corroborated by reading the remarks of Dr. Lee, in the agricultural department of the Patent Office Report. This report is not yet fully published, but we have received a portion of it published in advance of the book edition.

The suggestions for the improvement of agriculture, by Dr. Lee, are very interesting, and present facts, which not only the farmers of the Union, but every body else interested in the production of food, (that is to say, all who wish to eat two or three times every twenty-four hours) should ponder upon seriously.

These remarks show, conclusively, that we are every day robbing the earth of its fertility, and restoring but very little to it. History informs us that many tracts of country, in both hemispheres, now barren and unproductive, were once exceedingly fertile. Sicily was once very prolific in corn and provisions, but it is now the reverse. Many sections of the southern states have been exhausted of fertilizing particles—"worn out," as it is said, and now abandoned for the tardy process of being replenished by nature.

Here are some of the Doctor's whole subjects: "The Board of Agriculture, of Ohio, estimates the crop of corn in 1849, within the limits of that state, at seventy millions of bushels; and it will hardly be extravagant to say that the farmers of Ohio, Indiana, Michigan, Illinois and Wisconsin, export a million tons of breadstuffs and provisions, where they import one ton of the atoms drawn from their virgin soils to form agricultural products. Can it be said, in truth, that a million tons of bread and meat are produced from nothing?"

Will it be contended that the earth within the reach of good plowing contains an unlimited amount of the precise things compounded, to make the plants whose organic elements are taken from the soil and never restored? If this be true, then all fertilizers are not only unnecessary, but absolutely worthless.

This cannot be so; for lands that seventy years ago produced from twenty-five to thirty-five bushels of wheat in the State of New York, now yield only from six to nine bushels per acre, and in all the old planting states, the results of exhaustion are still more disastrous.

Again, he observes, "The continued fruitfulness of the earth is an interest for greater and more enduring than any form of government. If the twenty-two millions of people now in the United States may rightfully exhaust the natural fertility of one third of the arable lands of the country, the forty-four millions who will be here twenty-five years hence may probably consume the productivity of the remaining two thirds of all the American territory."

It is taking a broad and national view of the thing: It is looking ahead to the natural results of things, and contemplating the existence of circumstances which must inevitably follow causes now in action. What is the remedy? The study and universal dissemination of agricultural knowledge, and the practice of the knowledge in fulfilling the command of God in "replenishing" the earth wherever cultivated, whether in the garden or in the field; the easy, little enclosed farm of the New England, or the wide prairies of the Hoosier, God has not made the land exhaustless; it he had, he would never have given the command he did, that man should replenish it. It would have been useless.—*Maine Farmer.*

**Pork Making.**

Making pork is one of the most essential interests of the farmer, and may be made one of the most profitable. We question, however whether, as generally conducted, much money is made by feeding swine, and the reasons are sufficiently plain. In the first place, but little attention, if any is paid to the kind of hog used for feeding. It is enough, if the animal caught and caged in a pen is a hog. The fact that a given quantity of food fed to some breeds, will make nearly or quite as much again pork, as when fed to some other breeds, is overlooked; as an astonishing quantity of roots and grain is thus annually wasted. In the second place, much of the feeding is defective. The food may be good, but if given to the hog unprepared or uncooked, much of its efficiency is lost. To feed hogs profitably, they should from the first be kept in a thriving state. Not half fattened at one time, and then allowed to fall away till they are miserably poor; but kept constantly improving from the time they leave the sow until they are ready for slaughtering. It takes a much larger amount of food to raise an animal of any kind allowed to become poor, than to keep one constantly thriving. Again, the time allotted to feeding is usually too limited.—Good, firm, heavy pork cannot be made, no matter what may be the feed used, short of three or four months. Hogs may be pigged out and made to look pretty fat but their meat will not be hard and firm, and will be affected with the complaint called "struck in the pot." Hogs fatten much faster in moderate weather, than in severe; and hence the process of fattening should commence as early as the food to be used can be had. After the process of fattening begins, see that they have enough. To suppose a squealing, raving hog will fat, is a mistake, but unfortunately a common one.—*Dexterous Home Journal.*

To MAKE A FAT IN THE STICK.—More than twenty years since, I copied the following method of measuring hay from some publication, and having verified its general accuracy, I have both bought and sold by it and believe it may be useful to many farmers where the means of weighing are not at hand. "Multiply the length, breadth, and height into each other, and if the hay is coarse, what result on solid yards will make a ton.—*Franklin Intelligencer.*

SALTING HOGS.—By the advice of some of our farmers, I have fed my pigs salt, freely and regularly, especially while fattening, for four or five years, and am satisfied that it is of great service in giving permanency to the appetite and solidity to the flesh besides being well paid for expense and trouble in grateful grunts and smacking chops.—*Gen. Farmer.*


