Without this we can accomplish but little and yet there are but fem farms where a deficiency in this department Is not always encountered; withough facilities for its accumulation so abundantly exist wherever there is vegetable life or mineral waters of the commonest. kinds. No farmer, I contend, ever need be in want of the wherewithall to feed his crops or chrick his fields. They who complain most loudly in this particular do not rightly appreciate the advantages they fiave, nor are they prepared to avail themrelves of one-half the wealth and resources they in reality possess.

"It is rarely the case that we find any efforts whatever on the part of the farmer, to make his domestic animals subservient to the increase and angmentation of his manure heaps. His hogs do not work; his cattle and sheep sheds are not replenished with materials for compost, and the principal resource in fact, upon which he relies for renovating his soils when exhausted by the production of an emasculating succession of erops, is supplied by the throppings deposited in his enclosures by cattle, that in consequence of the imperfeet and singularly injudicious system he has adop: ed, cost him, annually, twice the amount they should, or would, were they compelled to work it the production of manuce, There are many sub-Mances which may be accumulated at lessure seasons, all of which, by proper management, may be easily and economically resolved into the food of plants. Every farm 3 and is replete with the principles of vegetable life and aliment. So are the lorests, the fields, the road-sides, the awamps and bogs-yet how few think of these sources of fertility? Not one in five, probably. When manure is mentioned, the idea is at once suggested of raking heaps of animal excrement, or of compost heaps, of which the ingredients are composed, mostly of vegetable matter which has been passed through the stomach of some animal, and which will restore to the soil less in the form of majure than it took away. By purveying more systematically we may carry much of real wealth to our fields, without abstracting in any degree from their vegetable powers. We may crop so as to retain all this fertility, and make annual and even increasing deposits besides. It ought, indeed, ever to be a standing rule with the agriculturist to leave his fields in the fall, richer and more affluent, than he found them in the spring. If he cultivates an exhausting crop, let him estimate accurately, the degree of exhaustion it produces—the amount of po bulum it requires, and graduate his applications ac cordingly. More should be returned than abstract-'ed in all cases, for it is bad policy, in every sense, to impoverish the poor. I trust that farmers, get the flatters himself that he can and will make it the innerally, are awake to the importance of this sub-terest of those wishing to purchase to give him a call ject, and that they will soon see it in its true light, as it is."

The Life of a Farmer.

The following appropriate remarks relative to the independent and happy life, of a farmer we find going the round of the press, without credit:-

If we were ever envious it was of the farmerthe intelligent, independent and happy farmer, who owns his farm, his house and barns, who was fee from debt, whose family was growing up prosperously around him, upon whom God seemed to store. We have seen such a farmer, and cou'd point to a handred such in our own county; and in sober truth, know of no man so happy and no business so permanently profitable, none indeed that makes the owner so independent, and places him so far above board. He has granaries filled with the production of his farm, barns with the stock raised, and hay made by his own labor. His cellar is filled with potatoes, and fifty kinds of the necessaries of life, almost everything necessary to leed him and his family. He may lead his own ox to the slanghter, raise his own pork, fatten and consume his own sheep, eat his own poultry, devour his own eggs, live upon his own home grown and made bread, wear his own cloth, raise his own wool, knochis own stockings, and make his own butter and cheese-in short, live like a prince, and dress comfortably without going at all from his own homestead. All this that makes the farmer the most independent man in the community is no fiction. Early in his business he wants less money than almost any man in pursuing the even tenor of his ways, because his business is of a character to require less money than any other,

TRIMMING TREES -A correspondent of the Germantown Telegraph says:

"I think the early part of June is probably the best time for cuiting out the small branches of fruit trees. The farmer has more leisure at this season bhan in May, and, if the limbs are not large, the wounds will heal rapidly, perhaps more rapidly s a perfect deception, and it is a very imperfect artithan in the preceding month. It is an excellent plan, I find, to go through the fruit orchard and earefully cut out all the decayed limbs, sawing them off smoothly, as near the point of junction as practicable, that the deposition of fresh granulous matter may insure a speedy cicatrization of the wound, and prevent disease. I have seen some orchards of promising and valuable trees nearly spuiled by the application of an axe in trimming, instead of a saw. It is better not to touch you trees than to mutilate them in this way."


