

Less of the Steamer Helena

The Steamer Helena was abandoned at sea on Nov. 26th. Three hundred and fifty passengers were drowned by the sinking of the ship. The rest were all saved, with nothing but their lives.

The following persons were drowned: John Johnson, 31 male, New York; Geo. Riley, seaman, London; John Hossin, seaman, London; Daniel McArthur, seaman, of Montreal; and five seamen passengers.

The Helena was on her passage from Baltimore to New York. She was in a sinking condition, and when she was lost by the steamer she had six feet of water in her hold. She was her last trip. Her cargo was about 150 tons of German and French merchandise, a large quantity of very valuable, 450 tons of coal and 100 tons of iron, the latter for ballast.

The passengers were 22 cabin, 21 amidship, and 11 steerage.

The crew including officers, engineers &c., were 181, mostly German. The ship was worth \$120,000, cargo valued at \$75,000, and was heavily insured in Wall St.

The passengers of the steamer have issued a call, expressive of the kindness of Capt. Hovey, in the treatment of the survivors taken from the wreck.
