

Political Rumors—Politics in Pennsylvania.

The Washington correspondent of the Herald gives the following rumor: Washington, May 6, 1851.—Mr. William D. Lewis, the Collector of the Customs for the District of Philadelphia, is once more triumphant, and will retain his place, from which there have been tremendous efforts to have him removed.

The joint opinion of Secretaries Webster, Graham and Stuart, has been set at naught, and President Fillmore thinks of resigning.
