Washington. May 6, 1851 .- Mr. William D Lewis, the Collector of the customs for the distric of Philadelphia, is once more triumphant, and wil retain his place, from which there have been tre mendous efforts maile to have him removed. Mi Senator Cooper and the Whig Committee have bee defeated.

The joint opinion of Secretaries Webster, Gra-ham Contad and Shart, has been set at naught by President Fillmore. This has had its effect, and Mr. Webster seriously thinks of resigning. To his course he is advised by Mr. Senator Cooper and the Whig Committee.

The Whig committee have learned from Presi i Fillmore the reason why he retains in office Collecter Lewis,

Gov. Johnston has addressed the President also. and has declared that he will not be a candidate for re-election, if his friend, Mr. Lewis, is not reained in his post as Collector. To this President Fillmore has replied, that the collector shall be re-tained. Mr. Cooper told Mr. Fillmore that this pledge to Gov. Johnston was a pledge to a coalition with free soilism and that the Union men of Pennsylvania would all so treat it.

It is further understood that Mr. Cooper and hi friends will now oppose no obstacle to the nomination of Gen. Scott for the Presidency, at the Penn-sylvania State Whig Convention; which will be in session next month, while Lewis and his friends, have pledged themselves to prevent this. Mr. Cooper told the President that Gen. Scott would be nominated by almost unanimous vote.

Mr. Webster will not be a party to this coalition with free sollism, and will not remain to assist Mr. Fillmore's cause; but it is said that he is determined to resign-leave the Cabinet, and step up himself.

THE-ATTICA AND HORNELLSVILLE RAILROAD has had its name changed to the Buffalo and New York City Railroad. It is to cross the Genesee river less than half a mile below the village of Portage, at right angles-there being straight lines on both sides.

The river is to be passed by a massive Frestle Bridge, built upon piers of cut stone, elevated above high water mark. From the bed of the river,-which is solid rock-the structure rises 230 teet to the rail, and is to be built as strongly as wood and iron can make it—it being estimated that it will require nearly 2,000,000 of feet of timber to complete it. The span of the river is 500 feet, and the bridge is to be extended a considerable distance on both sides, instead of embanking.


