

Agricultural

My friends do not mistake the folly of making a hill around every vegetable you cultivate in your kitchen garden. Observation will show you that as plants grow older, the root at the base of the stem, invariably elongate upward toward the surface, indicating thereby a disposition to be wholly excluded from the air. And besides, unless the vegetable be one that requires a large supply of moisture, you deprive it, in a great measure, of the benefit of the rains; by accumulating around it a heap of soil to carry off the water. The hoe should be applied early, to loosen the soil, and kill the weeds, not to bury the vegetable, and deprive it of the rains.

Keep the surface of the soil around your fruit tree clean and light. Should any of them become sickly, in dry weather apply a small quantity of compost, and cover the surface with straw. Over this pour a quantity of soap-suds every week, and the tree will speedily revive and go on as before. The straw keeps the moisture from evaporating and retains soil loose and light.

Liquid manure applied to vegetation in dull or cloudy weather, has twice the effect as when applied when the atmosphere is clear and dry. Very early in the morning, or after the sun has disappeared at night, is a favorable time to irrigate your garden beds.

Salt your animals of all kinds freely, while confined to green, succulent food. This will often prevent serious inconvenience and loss.

To Promote Health of Cattle.
Mix, occasionally, one part of salt with four or five, or six parts of wood ashes, and give the mixture to different kinds of stock, summer and winter. It promotes their appetite, and tends to keep them in a healthy condition. It is said to be good against box in horses, and murrain in cattle. It creates an appetite, and is good for various diseases. Some give it to an animal that is unwell. It is good for oxen troubled with the heat. If animals will not eat it voluntarily, mix it with potatoes or meal.

Feed all animals regularly. They not only look for their food at the usual time, but the stomach indicates the want of the stated period. Therefore feed morning, noon and evening, as near the same as possible.

Guard against the wide and injurious extremes of satisfying with excess and starving with want.

Food should be of a suitable quality, and proportioned to the growth and fattening of animals, to their production in young and milk, and to their labor or exercise. Animals that labor need far more food, and that which is more nutritious, than those that are idle. Guard all descriptions of stock against cold storms of rain, sleet and damp snow, and against lying out on cold ground in cold nights, in the spring and fall.

In a dry time see that animals have a good supply of pure water. When the fountains are low, they drink the drainings of water, which are unwholesome.

If barns and stables are very tight and warm ventilate in mild weather, even in winter.

In feeding animals on apples or roots, begin with a small quantity and gradually increase it. It would be better to have all changes in food made gradually, when there is a material difference in the nature of the food; as from low to grass, and reverse; from much fodder to much grain, and reverse.—*American Veterinarian.*

Preparing Land for a Crop.
A farmer has a field of clayey loam, which requires a week's work at least to prepare it for corn, oats, or barley. Now how ought he to proceed? It is not uncommon to see such lots turned over and the furrow slice laid day after day, to dry and bake in the sun, without the least attention to the plowing of the whole field is completed.

Well what better could he do?
Reduce what he has plowed to a fine tilth while it is moist and easily crumbles, not leaving it to lie one day before he puts on the harrow or the drag roller. A small share of labor at this time will do twice as much to pulverize the soil, as when it has hardened like an unburnt brick.

What! stop the plow before finishing the field; Farmers that drive ahead don't do so.
That is, they drive one day ahead, and leave their work two days behind. But let me ask what is the use of plowing land?
The use? why, to put the ground in order—you could not expect a crop without it.

Neither ought we to expect more than half a crop when it is only half pulverized. If we plow eight inches deep, and one half of this soil is in hard clods, how much better is it than to plow four inches deep, and have it thoroughly pulverized?—How much better is clod on the field than a stone?

Insects about Fruit Trees.
SALT.—It is of the greatest importance that all insects about fruit trees should be destroyed. This desirable end is effected in a variety of ways, one of which I will mention. As your trees begin to cast their fruit, turn in your sward—no matter how many, if your orchard is of considerable size, and permit them to remain there till the fruit attains its maximum size. By examination you will find that almost invariably every apple, pear, or other fruit that falls prematurely, contains one or more worms. These the hogs will destroy, and thus prevent injury from the same source in succeeding years. Where this method cannot be adopted, all the fruit that drops early from the boughs, should be carefully picked up, and fed to the swine in their sty.

LINE SALT, applied in considerable quantities, operate both as stimulants to the trees, and as a remedial agent in checking the ravages of the canker and other insectivorous depredations. Salt, also, in smaller quantities, is decidedly beneficial to most plants, and many are benefited by it when the quantity applied is large.

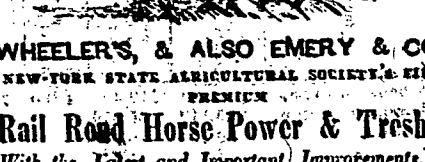
By experiments which I have recently made with salt, I write a friend long distinguished for his enterprise and intelligence in the pursuit of agricultural improvement, "I find that many plants flourish with so much salt as would immediately prove fatal to others—thus the quantity I allude to a few rocks of sulphate would destroy an oak. I am of opinion that those plants which do not receive immediate injury from the application of this substance, will derive great benefit from it."
