Nothing can be more curious or interesting than hese ancient pits or diggings. It may seem diffiult to believe that there was a race of men engagd extensively in mining for copper ons this conti-ent, long before it was discovered by Columbus, nd yet such was undoubtedly the fact. The forest trees growing on the embankments, and some trees growing in the pits themselves, will carry us back, n some instances, two or three centuries, and now many predecessors they had which grew and fell on the same spot, no one can tell. In these pits stone hammers are found in great abundance, from a single pound up to a weight which no single man wield. No metal tools of any soit are discovered. . How the ancients, with such simple means, could make such extensive excavations. and to what use they applied the vast amounts o copper which they must have obtained, it is difficult now to conceive. But the existence of these pus may always be taken as proof conclusive that here are vatuable copper veins below.
