

Letter from General Pierce. The Rochester Daily Advertiser of Aug. 30th, publishing the following letter from Franklin Pierce, in relation to the Democratic nomination for the Presidency, in regard to the religious and property qualification tests of New Hampshire. The letter was furnished to the Advertiser by Mr. Warren, to whom it was addressed.

My Dear Sir—It is impossible that a charge should be made against me which the Whig papers teemed with that to my sentiments upon the religious test contained in our State Constitution, which was adopted in 1792, and never amended since. The charge is contradicted by every word and act of my life having reference to the question, in any form directly or indirectly, I advocated the call of a Convention for the amendment of the Constitution, which assembled in November, 1850, and the most prominent object in my mind was to cast out the religious and property qualifications commonly called the religious and property qualification tests from our State Constitution. SCOTT ON THE CONSTITUTION—Article I, section 8, of the Constitution of the United States, says—Congress shall establish a uniform rule of naturalization. My mind inclines to the latter.'

Accident—An accident occurred on the Railroad from the Ramapo Road, on Tuesday forenoon, when the cars were going at a rapid rate around the curve just the other side of Spring Station. Owing to a flaw in the rim of one of the wheels, the wheel gave way, causing the engine, baggage car, and one of the passenger cars, to slide down an embankment of about fifteen or twenty feet. One man, a fireman, was killed outright; another man, as is thought, fatally wounded; several more were seriously injured. There were about two hundred passengers on the train at the time, all of whom were thrown into confusion, and it is remarkable, under the circumstances, that so few were badly hurt.
