Borough Ordinance. Council's Office, February 21, 1853.

At a meeting of the Town Council of the borough of Towanda, the following Ordinance was passed: Be it ordained by the Town Council of the borough of Towanda, that hereafter no building shall be erected or moved within the limits of said borough without application first made to the Council in writing, stating the kind of building materials to be used in its construction, and its locality—and being approved by said Council in pursuance of said application, that no wooden building shall hereafter be erected within the following limits to wit: On Bridge Street, within 60 feet of either side of said street, from the River to Main street; on Main Street within 100 feet of either side of said street from Bridge street to State street; and within 100 feet of either side of the Public Square. And that hereafter no wooden building shall be erected within said limits from any place without the same. And any wooden building erected upon, or moved into said limits in violation of this ordinance, shall be deemed a nuisance, and the person so erecting or moving such building shall be punished accordingly.
