WHEREAS, All laws to be efficient should have the approbation and sanction of the People : 3m14 Aud Whereas, It is represented that a large num-ber, if not a majority of the citizens of this Commonwealth, ore deeply impressed with the necessi ty of the Passage of a Prohibitory Liquor Law: And Whereas, It is impossible to obtain a certain indication of popular sentiment relating thereto by means of petitions and remonstrance : Therefore. \$1. Be it enacted by the Sunate and Hause of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Peansylvania in General Assembly mot, and it is hereby enacted by authority of the same, That the qualified voters of this Commonwealth are hereby authorized at the places for holding the general elections in their re spective walds, boroughs and townships, on the se-coud Tuesday of October next, to vote for and against a law which shall entirely prohibit by pro-No pupil will be received for a shorter period per and constitutional regulations and penallies, the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors, except for medical, sacramental, mechanical and artistical purposes. §2. 




