FROPOSITION PIRST-TO RE ARTICLE XI. SECTION 1. The aggregate amount of debts here-after contracted by the Common wealth shall never exceed the sum of five hundred thousand dollars, except in case of war to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, or to redeem the public debt of the Commonwealth, and the money so raised shall be applied to the purpose for which the debt may be contracted, to pay such debts, and to no other pur

Section 2. To pay the public debt of the Commonwealth, and debts which may hereafter be contracted in case of war to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, and to redeem the public dobt, the Legislature shall at their next session after the adoption of this section into the Constitution, provide by law for the creation of a sinking fund, which shall not be abolished until the said public debts be wholly paid, to consist of all the net annual income from the public works and stocks owned by the Commonwealth, or any other funds arising under any revenue law now existing or that may be hereiter enacted, so far as the same may be required p pay the interest of said debts semi-annually, and annualty to reduce the principal thereof by a sum not less than five hundred thousand dollars, increased yearly by compounding at a rate of not less than five per centum per annum—the said sinking fund shall be invested in the loans of the commonwealth which shall be cancelled from time to time in a manner to be provided by law-no portion of the sink ing fund shall ever be applied to the debt of five hundred thousand dollars mentioned in the first section of this article, but the said sinking fund shall and will be sold accordingly.

not in any way be given or loaned to or in aid of any individual, company, corporation or association, nor shall the commonwealth hereafter become a joint owner or stockholder in any company, association or corporation in this commonwealth, or elsewhere, formed for any purposes.
Section 4. The commonwealth shall never as-

sume the debts of any county, city, boro' or township, or of any corporation or association, unle s such debts shall have been contracted to repel invasion, suppress insurrection or to defend the State ⁻in war.

PROPOSITION SECOND-TO BE ARTICLE XI. Prohibiting Municipal Subscriptions.

The Legislature shall never authorize any city, county, borough or township, by a vote of its citizens or otherwise, to become a stockholder in any joint stock company, association or ocorporation, or to raise money for, or loan its credit to, or in aid of any such company or association.


