An Ordinance Relative to the Running at Large OF SWINE.

BE it Ordered by the Town Council of the Borough of Towns, That swine shall not be allowed to run at large within the square, streets, lanes or alleys of this borough. It shall be the duty of the High Constable, either by himself or some persons whom he may employ, to seize and shut up in some secure place all swine which may be found running at large upon the public squares or in any open street, alley or lane within this borough, and to be shut up on the same day upon which he shall make such seizure, advertise the said swine for sale at public vendue, giving not less than six nor more than eight days notice of said sale, by at least three notices thereof posted up in as many public places in said borough. At the time and place aforesaid, the said Constable shall expose said swine to public vendue, and shall sell the same to the highest and best bidder in the same manner that Constables are by law authorized to make sales by virtue of executions issued by Justices of the Peace. And the money raised by all such sales, after deducting costs and charges, shall be paid to the High Constable immediately paid over to the Treasurer of the Borough, for the use thereof.
And the said High Constable shall be entitled to charge and receive for executing this ordinance as follows:—For every hog, sheep or pig seized by him as aforesaid, 25 cents; for advertising the same each 25 cents; for keeping the same each 12 cents for every day the same shall be kept; for selling, each 25 cents. It is provided however, that if the owner of any such swine shall at any time before the same shall be sold pay to the said High Constable his fees for seizing, advertising and keeping as hereinbefore mentioned, that the said Constable shall not sell, but deliver the same to such owner or upon his order.
2. It shall be the duty of said High Constable to file in the office of the Secretary of the Borough within three days after each seizure, a statement or description of the swine seized, as near as may be, to be together with the date of the seizure, and to mention the square, street, lane or alley where seized, and such statement shall be prima facie evidence of the facts therein stated.

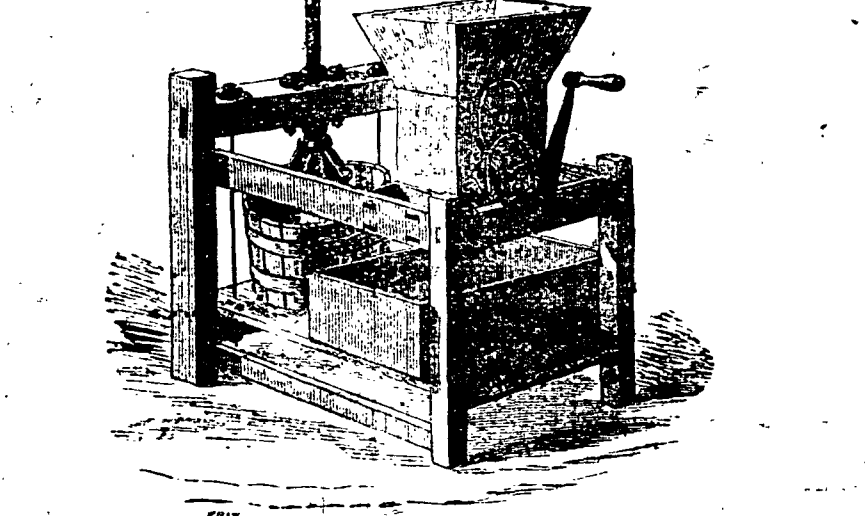

HICKOK'S PATENT IMPROVED CIDER MILL.

In the present arrangement of this highly approved and valuable Mill, the labor is divided by arranging a cutting cylinder to break the apples, and then deliver them to the lower cylinder to be reduced to pulp. By this arrangement the work is performed faster and with much less labor.
The Press is arranged with a much larger screw than formerly, and by a very ingenious device the use of the log is dispensed with, and the tub made to revolve at will, deliver the pulp, while at the same time the Cider is left clear by the method. The Cylinders are covered with heavy sheet zinc, both on their periphery and ends; the work in them is arranged so as not to swell, and the whole work on the Mill and Press made in the very best manner
