How then can any man say that the salary paid that officer cannot in any even burthen the tax-payers of the county, or that it does not in any way disturb our school fund? We expected the hear his demand urged upon the grounds of services rendered, and not upon grounds that there was money lying idle in the treasury, and that he might as well have it as those hawks about Harrisburg. If Mr. GUYER's positions be correct, why did not his friends give him all he asked, (\$2000) and even all he inwardly desired-but which his extreme modesty would not allow him to express ?-especially so, when it would cost us nothing ; and he so patriotically declared that he would not accept one cent of it if he thought it would.

The whole community, which was not in the secret of this movement, was astounded to hear Mr. GUYER ask for such an increase of his salary so soon after his laborious struggle for the office at \$500. And still more were those astounded who heard him talk about pay during his tremendous burst of self-sacrificing patriotism, (or "blowing his own horn," whichever people fancied it to be.) When called upon to give an account of his stewardship, he took the floor and belched forth into a most extravagant eulogy upon himself and his masterly (long) report-expatiated upon what he was going to make the Legislature do one of these days by way of uniform taxation for school purposes, and made a solemn appeal for school purposes, and made a solemn appeal for the county to endorse his sentiments by giving August 7, 1855.
