SEVERAL RAILROAD ACCIDENTS.—Several accidents occurred on the Erie Road, early this morning, by which one person was instantly killed, and a number more or less injured. The Night Express train from New York, about two miles this side of Addison, was thrown from the track, causing almost a complete wreck of all the cars. Ir. Peck, of Connecticut, was instantly killed; a young lady and both limbs broken; the engineer was very seriously injured.

THREE GENTLEMEN FROM PENNSYLVANIA, Mr. James Hutchinson, of Philadelphia, and Messrs. John Sharpless and Walter Scott, of Catawissa, who started at Haight's last night, and who were on the train, were brought back here by the Day Express to-day. Mr. Hutchinson has both limbs injured, near the ankle, one being fractured; Mr. Scott is severely bruised, but no bones broken; Mr. Sharpless received some bruises, but not of a serious nature. He describes the crash as most terrible, and truly miraculous that no more lives were lost.—*Edin. Gazette.*

DOUBT TRAGEDY IN BROOME COUNTY.—On Tuesday last we learn from the Binghamton Republican, a colored man named JARED CARTON, was stabbed by an insane person named CHAS. LATOURETTE, in the village of Union, Broome County. It appears that LATOURETTE went into the store of Mr. CHIRSTIAN MERSERAU, in Union, and asking for the show case a dagger, immediately stepped into the street and stabbed the unfortunate young man through the heart, causing instant death. LATOURETTE had been insane for the past two years and some time ago attempted to take his own life. It is reported that he gave no reason for killing his victim, other than he "did not like his looks." He was taken to Binghamton and lodged in jail. Soon after LATOURETTE was lodged in jail, he terminated his existence by cutting his own throat with a razor, which had been accidentally left in the cell where he was confined.

THE POISONING CASE.—On Monday last Thomer Haas, and the jurists summoned in the poisoning cases, at Danville, met at the Court House. Dr. Simington testified to the holding of arsenic in both stomachs, and to the fact that the death of David Twigg and Mrs. Clark was caused by poison. Curtis Herrington, Clerk in Chaffin & Hughes Drug Store, testified to selling arsenic to J. W. Clark, and Robert McCarty testified to selling arsenic to Mrs. Twigg.

Gov. BEBB DISCHARGED.—Ex-Gov. William Bebb, who recently shot and killed a young man named Clemens, who was one of the charitable party who had beset his residence, in Winnebago Co., Illinois, was at his own request, examined by a Court of Magistrates, and after a thorough examination, discharged. The *Rockford Register* publishes at length the evidence elicited, and remarks as follows:

"From the testimony it will be seen the fact is established that Gov. Bebb did order the rioters off before firing, though it would seem the order was not heard by them. The defense also testified to the guns being pointed towards the house, while the rioters are positive they were not. There always will be a difference of opinion in the public mind as to how much provocation will justify one man in shooting down another, even where the law prescribes the act, and we have no desire to discuss the present case in that aspect. It is an unfortunate affair in any point of view. The practice of charivariing newly married couples, one which ought not to be tolerated in a civilized community, and we regret to learn has been much too frequent in this section for a year or two past. Although in most instances intended for sport, they are little better than mobs, and should be discouraged by every right-thinking citizen. We hope the result of one at Gov. Bebb's may prove a salutary warning. About a year since an individual was shot at Elgin while engaged in a similar riot."

A riot between the contractors and laborers on the Racine and Mississippi Railroad, occurred recently at Medina, Winnebago County, Illinois. Two of the rioters were killed and a number seriously injured. The citizens of Medina were required to arm themselves against the rioters, and an intense excitement prevailed.

An entire block of buildings, known as the "Dane County Block," at Madison, Wis., was destroyed by fire on Saturday morning, causing an insured loss of \$75,000.

DR. CHAFFE AND DRED SCOTT.—There has been much studied misrepresentation as to Dr. CHAFFE the Republican member of Congress from Massachusetts and his ownership of DRED SCOTT. The facts are, that the ownership of the slave rested in Mrs. CHAFFE as heir to an estate, and the executor, Mr. SANFORD, who alone had power to act in the matter, has been insane for some time past, so that nothing could be done about it. He has lately died, and as soon as it was possible Mrs. CHAFFE has manumitted the slaves.
