RESOLUTION Proposing Amendments to the Constitution the Commonwealth.

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in Generel As-sembly met : That the following amendments are propos-ed to the constitution of the commonwealth, in accor-dance with the provisions of the tenth article thereof. **FIRST AMENDMENT.** There shall be an additional article to said constitution to be designated as article eleven, as follows :-

to it any part of the taxes, or other revenues of the state, not required for the ordinary and current expenses of government, and unless in case of war, invasion or insur-rection, no pert of the said sinking fund shall be used or applied otherwise than in extinguishment of the public debt, until the amount of such debt is reduced below the sum of five millions of dollars. SECTION 5. The credit of the commonwealth shall not in any manner or event he pledged or loaned to any

SECTION 7. The legislature shall not authorize any county, city, borough, township, or incorporated district, by virtue of a vote of its citizens, or otherwise, to be-are a calculation in any company association or corr

by virtue of a vote of its criticals, of otherwise, to be come a stockholder in any company, association, or cor-poration; or to obtain money for, or loan its credit to, any corporation, association, institution, or party. SECOND AMENDMENT. There shall be an additional article to said constitution to be designated as article XII, as follows:

ARTICE XII. ARTICE XII. OF NEW COUNTIES. No county shall be bivided by a line entting off over one-tenth of its population, (either to form a new county or otherwise.) without the express assent of such coun-ty, by a vote of the electors thereof ; nor shall any new county be established containing last than furn hundred e established, containing less than four hundred square miles.

Any city containing a sufficient number of taxables to entitle it to at least two representatives, shall have a separate representation assigned it, and shall be divided into con-venient districts of contiguous territory, of equal taxa-ble population as near as may be, each of which districts shall elect one representative."
