Dr. Bliss, by appointment of the Association, read an interesting report on the subject of a New System of School Readers. The object of the report was introduced by stating the twofold view of education but to provide for present wants and to anticipate future necessities. The cravings of the young mind for knowledge, it was said, must be met with a varied supply, as mind cannot be confined to a limited number of objects without being enfeebled, and the lessons of nature are presented in great variety. The practical mistake to be corrected in our present system of School Readers, is that they aim at nothing beyond learning the English language. As the common school affords an opportunity of in practical life, and as school readers have ought to be made subservient to the great purpose of conveying this knowledge ; and instead of being seldom or almost never read for the profit of this meeting. purpose of communicating knowledge, they ought to be used for directing the thoughts to the important practical subjects of every day life. School Readers ought to be books on Natural Science, or Intellectual and Moral Science, Physiology and other scientific subjects, which, without being systematic treatises, might yet present such views of the sciences and of their fundamental principles, as would lead the young to appreciate their value and keep alive and profitably gratify the inquisit iveness of youth

The thanks of the Association was tendered to Dr. Bliss for his report.
