Atchison Districts—has gone overwhelmingly Free-State. Such a disparity of strength was searcely ever before exhibited between two contending parties for power as is seen in the rote throughout all Kansas, except on the immediate Missouri border. Seventy to nothing 150 to 3—240 to 0—905 to 11—this is the way the vote runs where the polls were not convenient of access from Missouri. We said the Free-State ticket was overwhelmingly victorious except in the two districts mentioned. In this we slightly erred. According to the true vote cast in this district, the Free-State Party carried the day by 1,300 majority, out of an aggregate of about 2,300 votes, all was right so far, and would stand so, except for the fraudulent returns mentioned elsewhere. Admitting, however, the Johnson County.

and all other fraudulent returns, Marcus J. Parrot is elected by about three thousand mafailed and Secretary Stanton has indicated in readiness to give him his certificate of elec-

Johnson County has sent up to the "Secretary's office returns giving for the county some 1,700 Pro-Slavery majority. The mass of these returns are from the Oxford Precinct, a little town on the Missouri line, or, rather. the village, what there is of it, is on the Missouri side. There are not thirty legal voters living at that Precinct, and only some eighty were polled the first day. But the polls were kept open, cr pretended to be, another day; and now the pretence is made that from a thousand to fifteen hundred votes were polled the second day. Now, according to the census of the Pro-Slavery men themselves, Johnson county contains only 496 voters, and a total population of only 890 inhabitants! Of course monstrous returns give prima facie evilence of being fraudulent throughout. A majority of 10,000 would be just as reasonable and honest from Johnson County as this 1,700

We learn that Secretary Stanton openly grows his conviction that the returns are fraud lent, and, of course, under such circumstances, he can give no cirtificates based upon them. Inleed, should an attempt be made to defraud he members rightfully elected by the people, f their seats, by the admission of these fraudlent returns, we think we speak advisedly when we say, that the peace of the whole Terriary would be immediately and most imminently

azarded thereby. The people of Kansas have staked all, alnost upon this election, and now they will not tand it to be defrauded again out of their just ights. If it be again demonstrated to us that here is no reliance to be placed upon the balot-box, what alternative is left but that of erpetual degredation and slavery, or a prompt currence to the anal resort of oppressed and own-trodden peoples? Those now in auority-especially the Secretary and Govern--have resting upon them, at this moment, a nost awful responsibility. Upon their wisdom and justice in this case depends the peace of Kansas, and we may add, the peace and peretnity of the Union.

The rights of the freemen of Kausas cannot ong be tampered with through such damnable neans. Federal bayonets will prove inefficient or the protection of members whose seats are thus fraudulently obtained, and who never can
