

GRAFTS.—For the Northern and Southern States, the present is a good month for grafting. It is intended to propagate the apple or gooseberries, take cuttings from the sap strikers, and bury them in the cellar. And so, if grafts are wanted for apple or pear or cherry, let them be either buried in the garden in a shallow trench, or, what is better, be taken into the water with damp sand or moss or peat, and covered with a glass jar. What is needed is to keep them moist enough to prevent their shriveling, and to keep them from getting too warm. They are wanted in the Spring. In cuttings, remember that only the wood of the previous season's growth is of any use, and that the plants should be healthy. After being cut, each sort in a bundle by itself, and wrap each with paper, so that it will not become a prey to insects. Between this time and Spring, the bundles over or twice, to see that they are in a good state of preservation.
