**News from all Patrons.**

The Ohio Senate has passed a resolution for the appointment of a Select Committee of three, with power to send for persons and papers, to inquire into the cause for the statement of Ex-Governor Ford, in his evidence before the investigating committee, that they, the Hon. Messrs. Pennington and Pennington, "felt certain of it" (the bill) going through the Senate.

The Milwaukee News contradicts the telegraphic report that the Legislative Committee have accepted Governor Bradford, of Wisconsin, of completing in the La Crosse Railroad corruption. The committee simply declared that they could find no proof of a prior understanding between him and Kilbourne that he should receive the bonds in consideration of his approving the bill, but did not exonerate him; on the other hand, they ensure him for accepting the bonds after signing the bill of grant.

At the commencement of the Jefferson Medical College in Philadelphia, on Tuesday, 255 students graduated.

A young man named John Bates was killed at Fulton, Tenn., March 14, by his father. A dispute occurred between them on some cards, when the father stabbed his son in the left breast, causing instant death.

At the United States Army, in Springfield, Mass., thirty-six workmen have been discharged, and the wages of the 150 remaining at work are reduced ten per cent, and in a few instances twenty per cent—the consequence of the failure of the Appropriation bill.

The four criminals under sentence of death in Baltimore, were on Wednesday respiteed by Governor Hicks until the 8th of April. They were to have been executed on Friday last. The Governor warns them that they may expect no further delay.

The Democrats of Rhode Island in State Convention, Thursday 17th, nominated Elisha R. Potter, of South Kingstown, for Governor, and Fenner Brown, of Cumberland, for Lieutenant-Governor.

Another defalcation has been discovered in Illinois. J. P. West, late Sheriff and Collector of Mason county, in that State, has disappeared, and the signature of his bond are held to the State for a deficiency in an amount of State revenue collected to the amount of \$2,000.

The Ohio Legislature has ordered the printing of the report of the Corruption Investigating Committee, unaccompanied by Governor Chase's Message.

A despatch from Leavenworth, Kansas, states that in the case of Mr. Day and his son, who were admitted from Kansas into Missouri, charged with aiding the escape of slaves, a change of venue has been granted—the trial being transferred to St. Joseph, Missouri, later from the gold mines to the 12th of January have been received. The accounts continue of a flattering character. The rush towards Pike's Peak has fairly commenced.

The New Yorkers have had a few costly strawberries and a little asparagus from the South, with plenty of radishes, and shad from the Hudson. At Marietta, Florida, strawberries were plenty on the 26th ult.

Rev. Dr. Ide showed some "eight dollar leads" at a temperance meeting in Springfield, Mass., on Wednesday, the 9th, which was manufactured at a cost of only ten cents per gallon.

The loss in fruit trees in Illinois within the last three years is estimated at about \$3,000,000. The relative nature of a soil is supposed to be the cause.

We learn from the Los Angeles Star, of February 5th, that Lieutenant Beale's expedition was about one hundred and fifty miles beyond Santa Fe, in excellent health, getting along as well as could be desired—having encountered no interruption to his labors from the Indians. It will be two months before he reaches California.

An attempt was made by an excited mob to break into and destroy the house of M. Saloman, the minister of finance under Soule. The President managed to quell the excitement, and M. Saloman had sought refuge on the British ship Basilisk. Capt. Phayre, of the British war vessel Basilisk, who had come to protect the interests of British residents, was presented to President Jefferson by Mr. Byron, English vice-consul, who took the opportunity of making a long congratulatory speech to the new President. Jefferson's reply was short and dignified.

Hon. Daniel S. Dickinson and Hon. John A. Dix, of New York, have written letters in favor of the acquisition of Cuba.

It is rumored that the grand jury are divided in opinion as to whether Mr. Sickles shall be prepared for murder or manslaughter.

The troubles in the Eliot school, in Boston, caused by the dissatisfaction of Catholics with the religious rules, are about ended, by the return of a large number of the children, brought back by their parents.

The Wilmington (North Carolina) Journal states that a man who professes to be a weather wise, gives it as his opinion that there will be no rain during the whole month of May. He says the same thing occurred during the year 1859, and again in 1859.

During eleven months of the last year Great Britain exported manufactured cotton goods of the value of \$145,000,000.

It is stated that Mr. Preston, our Minister to Spain, will be received there unconditionally, and will be presented with his passports immediately on making any proposition for the purchase of Cuba.

Fall returns from the election in the senatorial district made vacant by the death of Hon. Horatio J. Stone, have not yet been received. George D. Lamont's (Republican) majority, as far as heard from, is about 1,800.

Southern papers concur in the statement that "vegetation in that latitude is at least one month in advance of ordinary years." Fruit trees are in blossom, and flowers of various kinds in bloom. In the North, the winter has been remarkably open.

A precocious youngster, named O'Donnell, nineteen years old, is on trial in St. Louis for being married to three wives at the same time.

The Arkansas legislature passed a law, which is to take effect from the 1st of January, 1860, prohibiting the employment of free colored persons on water crafts navigating the rivers of that State. A violation of this law is to be considered a high misdemeanor, and upon conviction, subjects the party having charge of such a craft to a fine from \$500 to \$1,000, and imprisonment not exceeding twelve months.

**Foreign News.**

The screw steamship Wrecker, of the Bremen line, having touched at Cork, brings European advices to the 6th inst. Further changes had taken place in the British ministry; while others, indicating the withdrawal of the Lord Chancellor, and of the Colonial Secretary were confidently announced as on the eve of occurrence. The government measure of reform had not grown in popularity since the previous intelligence. The impression appears to be that the bill will not obtain a second reading; while some predict a ministerial resignation as the immediate result. In reference to the war question the news is of a more tranquilizing character. Rentes and Consols had both advanced. One cause of this was an official denial in the Monitor that the French army was to be placed on a war footing; the obvious indisposition of the French people to embark in the war, and rumors of the immediate withdrawal of the French and Austrian forces from the Roman States. Lord Cowley's intervention at Vienna was also regarded with more hopefulness. On the other hand there was no notable abatement of French preparations for a campaign, while the Austrian Army in Italy is avowedly placed upon a war footing. The Emperor of Austria, it is represented, is eager for the conflict, and is warmly sustained not only by the population of Vienna, but of all Germany.—Prussia, in the event of an outbreak, will preserve neutrality, while the southern States of the Germanic Confederation will doubtless take the field with Austria. The intelligence from India, China and Australia is later, but unimportant.
