Cellars-Open for thorough ventilation as early as possible. Remove all refuse and decaying vegetables. Sort potatoes, apples, etc. Preserve beets, carrots, cabbages, etc., for seed. Whitewash the walls and posts at an early day.

Clover--Sow, upon light snow, or when the ground is well opened by a morning frost.— Use plenty of seed.

Draining-Lay the drain as early as frost will allow. If these can not be procured, subsoil wet lands intended for grain. Clear out open ditches, adding the muck to the manure

Fences-Put in repair, or as soon as frost is out of the ground. See particularly to line fences. Plant hedges, in localities not too cold. Prepare posts, rails and gates in stormy weather.
