A DOUBLE HOMICIDE.-A double murder was committed in New York on the 1st inst. pear Third Avenne. Mr. John Walton, a wealthy distiller living on 25th street was shot in cold blood by some unknown hand. He has since died. The flying murderer was followed by several persons, when he turned and fired on his pursuers. Mr. John W. Matthews, a railroad contractor, was shot dead by one of the discharges, and the assassin is yet unknown, though suspicion points strongly to Charles and Edwin Jeffords, the sons of Mrs. LADIES' DRESS GOODS, OF ALL DESCRIPTIONS Walton by a former husband. Mr. W. married his wife, then the widow Russel, some time ago, but was not long in discovering her true character-loose, unprincipled, violent tempered and a bigamist. He sued for a divorce -He was wealthy, and neither she nor her sons were willing to lose their claim on his wealth, and have resorted to all kinds of intimidation -repeatedly threatening his life. This nefar ious deed is attributed to their malice.

VISIT OF THE PRINCE OF WALES .- The steamer Persia brings intelligence that the Prince of Wales would leave England on the 11th inst., for Canada, in the St. George screw ship, twenty guns, attended by the Earl of St. GERMAINS, the Lord Steward of the Queen's household and a large retinue. It is now understood that he will extend his travels far West, and employ perhaps two months in making the proposed tour. In this case, he can not well avoid American territory, but as yet the United States Government has received no official intimation of an intended visit.

THE GREAT EASTERN.—The monster steamship Great Eastern is proving a failure as a "show." The charge of one dollar per head for admission is justly regarded as an extor-tion, and the number of visitors is limited to from 500 to 1,200 daily. The charge for admission in England was half-a-crown, or about 60 cents. It is probable that the ship will be exhibited along the coast for some months, or until huge proportions cease to be a novelty.
