

Mr. Douglas and Leocompton.

The responsibility of denying to the people of Kansas the right to vote upon the Leocompton Constitution, has hitherto been thrown exclusively upon the President Buchanan.

1. Did you, or not, before or during the session of the Leocompton Constitutional Convention, or after the adjournment of the same see a letter addressed to JOHN CALHOUN, President of said Convention, or to any one else, by Mr. Douglas, in which he (Mr. Douglas) suggested the plan of submission which was adopted by said Convention, or signify that such a plan of submission would meet his approval?

2. Did not JOHN CALHOUN, the President of the Leocompton Convention, inform you that a letter had been received from Mr. Douglas, in which was foreshadowed a plan of submission, and was not the plan finally adopted the same that was understood to be the plan of Mr. Douglas?

3. Did you, or not, in conversation with Mr. Calhoun, or with any one, whose political and personal relations towards Mr. Douglas, and Mr. Calhoun authorize a belief that such person spoke authoritatively, learn that a plan of submission had been indicated by Mr. Douglas, and was it not understood that if the plan thus indicated was adopted, he (Mr. Douglas) would support and sustain it in Congress?

To the second and third of these questions Messrs. T. Todd, O. C. Stewart, B. T. Franklin, C. K. Mobley, L. J. Eastin and G. B. Redman, now opponents of Mr. Douglas, answer affirmatively, and Mr. James Donnell, one of his supporters, denies all knowledge of the letter read, and Mr. Wm. G. Mathias, a prominent citizen of Leavenworth, states that a son of Gen. Calhoun informed him that the document is now in the possession of the General's widow, and that she has already been offered \$2,000 for it, but has refused to surrender it for special reasons.

We should like to see that letter. It might clear up a point which was raised by the testimony before the Corode Committee, but was left somewhat in obscurity. Gov. Walker as will be recollected, testified that he went out to Kansas under the strongest assurances from the Administration, of their desire to have the Constitution to be formed by the Leocompton Convention submitted to the people for acceptance. He also testified that a few days before the question whether the Convention would submit the Constitution to the popular vote, was voted upon. Gen. Calhoun, who, as he says, "had been the distinguished and special leader of the Douglas Party in Kansas, and was supposed to have been appointed Surveyor-General upon Judge Douglas' recommendation," came to him and "submitted, substantially, the programme as to Slavery, which was subsequently adopted by the Convention," and asked his concurrence in it, assuring him "that was the programme of the Administration," and that the assurance that was so "came to him in such a manner as to be entirely reliable."

Subsequent evidence seems to have led the Committee to suppose that this shape, in which the Leocompton Constitution was finally adopted, was got up by the Administration in Washington, and sent to Kansas by an agent named H. L. Mann, who was sent by the Department of the Interior, just at that time. They accordingly had Mr. Mann before them. His testimony, however, did not sustain the supposition of the Committee. While he stated that he took an active part in the proceedings of the Leocompton Convention, and even drew himself, as we understand his testimony, the provision for the submission of the Slavery schedule which was finally adopted by the Convention, he yet stated that so far as the Administration gave him any instruction about the matter, they were that he was to favor the submission of the whole Constitution to the people, and that he did so, and only favored the submission of the Slavery schedule after the submission of the whole Constitution had been voted upon.

But Mr. Mann testifies that "The plan finally adopted was regarded by Mr. Calhoun, and he so assured his friends, as the favorite plan of Mr. Douglas; and he stated when he finally succeeded in getting the Slavery clause submitted, that he had rendered an important service to his friend Douglas and he at once wrote to him announcing the result, and inclosed a copy of the schedule," and that he himself "saw the letter, and carried it to the Post-Office at Leavenworth City." Elsewhere he says: "He (Calhoun) manifested much anxiety that the action of the Convention should be sustained by the people, because he believed that action met the peculiar views of Mr. Douglas."

Now, do not the answers of these members of the Convention, given above, make it quite probable that the source from which Calhoun got his idea as to the change of view on the part of the Administration, was that letter of Judge Douglas? Would it not be somewhat remarkable if it should turn out that the plan of submitting the Slavery schedule only, for accepting which Mr. Buchanan has received such obsequious and obsequious, was after all, an idea which sprang from the brain of the great Squatter Sovereign himself? That letter might throw light upon these interesting questions. Can it not be brought out, as a companion-piece to the letter of Mr. Buchanan produced at last by Gov. Walker before the Corode Committee? They would throw considerable light upon each other, and upon the Kansas policy of the Democracy.—N. Y. Times.

A PUBLIC LOSS.—It is with great regret that we learn this district is about to lose one of the shining lights of Democracy. The Hon. E. B. THE DOUGLAS TICKET WITHDRAWN!

The recent overwhelming triumph in Pennsylvania seems to have effected our opponents in a singular manner, judging from the manoeuvres which have since taken place among the leaders. The Breckinridge Committee, of which WELSH is Chairman, recently held a meeting, and instead of forming a Fusion, rescinded their former action, and resolved to stand by the Electoral Ticket formed at Reading. This ticket has upon it, a large preponderance of Breckinridge men.

The straight Douglas committee recently met at Philadelphia, withdrew the Douglas electoral ticket and also resolved to support the Reading electoral ticket, although Douglas has but few friends upon the ticket, and a portion have declared they would not cast their votes in the electoral college for him, under any circumstances! We are somewhat curious to see what course FORNEY will recommend a policy so utterly at variance with all his professions. Those papers which have raised the Douglas electoral ticket under the banner of "No compromise with Traitors," are in rather an awkward position.

The withdrawal of the Douglas electoral ticket has been caused by motives of policy on the part of his friends. The Breckinridge men succeeded at Reading, in possessing themselves of the organization and placing upon the electoral ticket, a majority of secessionists. That ticket was likely to receive the votes of a large majority of the Democracy of the State, while the straight Douglas ticket would not receive the votes of a quarter of the friends of the Little Hamburg. Such is Democracy in Pennsylvania! The Douglas managers dare not, under the circumstances permit their ticket to remain in the field—while the Breckinridge managers are satisfied with compelling the former to back down from their lofty position, and swallow a ticket composed of men, in the main, who openly declare they prefer the election of LINCOLN to the success of DOUGLAS!

We do not believe that this arrangement has been made with any other purpose than to conceal the weakness of the respective parties. But the effect of it is that but two electoral tickets will be voted in Pennsylvania. The trafficking Bell men will support the Reading ticket, notwithstanding the slight which has been put upon them. To defeat the combination it will be necessary for the Republican vote to be polled. A feeling of security which would induce Republicans to stay away from the election, might lose the State. We want vigorous, determined action until 7 o'clock of the sixth of November. We want not only a majority for Old Abe, but such an overwhelming majority as will demonstrate that Pennsylvania is sound to the core, and carry with it a moral force, which shall not be disregarded.

ANDREW G. CURTIS, our victorious standard bearer in the recent State contest and who has been proclaimed the choice of the people of this Commonwealth for Governor by a majority of upwards of thirty thousand, is still enlisted in the war, and intends to keep his armor on until the final battle has been fought and won. He has recovered from his hoarseness, and is ready to take the stump for Honest Old Abe. He will speak for Lincoln at various places in this State and New Jersey before the close of the Presidential contest.

A Republican United States Senator, in place of Dr. FREN, is secured by the election of a strongly Republican Legislature in Indiana. Another Republican Senator is gained in Pennsylvania, to succeed Mr. BIGLER. These are important changes. The Senate will presently be redeavored.

"If the Union cannot stand a change of administration," says the Providence Journal, "if it exists only by the sufferance of the minority, then it is already practically dissolved, and we live not in a confederacy, of equal States, but in a government half of sovereign States and half of subject provinces."

The probable majority in the State for Curtis is about 32,000. We shall publish the official table as soon as it is complete.

ONE MORE CHARGE!

Republicans! the battle may be won, but the victory is not yet secured. It needs one more gallant charge, and the field is ours! We enjoin upon every Republican to prepare for the onset. It will not do to lay down our arms, in security, until the Sixth of November has passed, and a Nation's Suffrages has elevated LINCOLN to the Presidency.

Republicans of Bradford! It remains only for you to make preparations for getting out the voters. It would be humiliating to have LINCOLN's majority in Bradford less than CURTIS'.
