

LOCAL AND GENERAL.

A SERMON to the Young Men will be preached, at the Baptist Church, on Saturday evening, next, Jan. 13. All are invited to attend.

The Convention is under the direction of Prof. Perkins, who will soon be known as an instructor with an attainable success. The Convention closes with a Concert on Friday evening.

THE SLEIGHING.—It has been said that "a thing of beauty is a joy forever"; but the promise of the day's beautiful sleighing which we had at the beginning of the year has not been fulfilled, and has dispersed to all sayings. The few inches of snow that fell has entirely disappeared under the influence of sun and rain, and the sleighs and "merry bells" have retired in disgust.

RUNAWAY.—As Mr. Preston, of this place was driving up Main street, Saturday morning, his horse became frightened at some boys who were sliding down the side-walk of a cross street, and starting suddenly, threw out the driver, and ran up street on the sidewalk, smashing the buggy to atoms. Mr. P. was not injured, but the boys can not be too careful in sliding down the cross-walk, as a number of accidents from frightening horses has already occurred.

EMERA AMUSEMENTS.—Howard & Campbell's entertainments on Saturday evening at the City Hall, at which a prize of a gold bracelet was offered to the gentleman who brought the greatest number of ladies, and a gold pin to the gentleman who brought the next greatest number. On Monday evening entertainment was given for the benefit of the Fire Department, at which a beautiful silver goblet was given to the author of the best conundrum, and a superb slipper to the author of the worst one. The result not transpired as yet.

HORRIBLE ACCIDENT.—A dispatch from Williamsport informs us of a shocking accident which took place there yesterday. During a salute which was being fired in honor of Major Anderson, Mr. Ed. Wilkinson and Mr. Joseph Burr were seriously injured by the premature discharge of a cannon. The former had his left arm blown off at the elbow, his right hand shivered to pieces, one eye put out, and was otherwise horribly mangled and disfigured. His recovery is regarded as extremely doubtful. Mr. Burr had his right arm broken near the shoulder, and nearly torn off. He was not otherwise much injured.

CATAMONT KILLED.—Daniel Moody, of this place, while hunting on Friday last week in Monroe township, succeeded in bagging a large specimen of the same named animal. It appears that the catamont had been kept up on Mr. M.'s dog, and upon his going to hunt he left the dog and sprang upon him. Not having had time to fire a shot, it became a rough and tumble struggle, which, after a long struggle, with the assistance of the dog, he succeeded in dispatching the "varmint," but to his injury to himself a torn suit of clothes.

UNION PRAYER MEETINGS.—The present year has been set apart as a time of mutual effort by all the evangelical churches of this and the old country, as a week of prayer for the advancement of the Christian cause. The movement originated in England, and has been generally responded to. In this borough meetings were held at the Presbyterian church on Tuesday, and at the Baptist on Wednesday evenings. The people are much alarmed, and a general solemnity pervades the community.
