[For the Reporter.] A COUNTY POOR HOUSE.

Petitions to the Legislature in favor of the erection of a county poor house in Bradford county, are about to be put in circulation, and I beg leave to direct the attention of the public to some of the advantages of such an insti-

1. It is much more economical than the present system The amount of poor taxes paid by the people of the county is very large. There are few of the townships in which no poor tax is necessary, and many of our townships and boroughs are heavily burthened for the support of the poor. That all the paupers of the county could be supported at a much less expense if kept together is as evident as that a family can live more cheaply at the same table than if each person were separately provided or. If the statistics of the amount of poor taxes now aid in Bradford county were collected, it would show an rmous expenditure. This could certainly be greatly whiced by the purchase of a good tract of land, the erection of large buildings upon it, and the supporting of all the county poor in one establishment. Their condinuch more decent and comfortable,—there would be fewer sham paupers-a considerable share of their food could be raised upon the land, these of them who would be at times able to work could be furnished with employment, and the institution could thus be made

2. The burden is now not equally borne. Many of o townships and boroughs are quite small, and some of the The Towanda Gas and Water Company. oorest have the misfortune to have so many paupers that they are unable to do much for them. The township organization is convenient in some respects, but it too small in Pennsylvania for this purpose. There is reason why the poor of the county should not be suported at the county expense, every tax payer would hen pay his proper share of the cost, which being thus equally distributed, would be much less oppressive.

3. Much litigation would be avoided. Few persons are sware of the expense arising out of disputes between the or districts as to the settlement of paupers. The facts which a settlement depends are frequently difficult to merain with certainty and are fruitful sources of law wits, attended with heavy bills of costs and expenses, be paid out of the poor taxes. This would all be avoided making t he whole county a single poor district.
